{ Revolutionary Claim,
Set June 7, 1832.

State of Indiana - Marion County -

On this third day of March A.D. 1832,
personally appeared in open Court before the Honourable Nathan D.
Morris President, and George Smith and Joshua Stephens Esqrs.
his associates, Judges of the Circuit Court of the County of Marion,
now sitting, Robert Carr a resident of the County of Marion
Appalachia, in the said State of Indiana, aged seventy three
years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on
his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the
benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7, 1832 -

That he entered the service of the United States during the
revolutionary war under the following named officers and
served as herein stated - He volunteered into a company
of Virginia Militia, in Augusta County in the State of Virginia,
under Captain Drimble, a Militia Capt. some time in the month
of March, and he thinks in the year 1780, as it was to the best of his
recollection in the spring of the year before the battle at
Guilford Court House, that immediately after entering the service
as aforesaid he was marched under the aforesaid Capt. to Rich-
ard Brook House, on the Buchanan River, in the extreme
frontier of the State of Virginia, in a company of about fifty men,
that after a hard march of sixteen days Capt. Drimble was
the party under his command, at the aforesaid Brook house
(having crossed the mountains at Laurel Gap) where they
were stationed with his men for five months which term

having expired the company was marched back to near
Stanton in Augusta County aforesaid where they were
disbanded, but received no discharge. During this time
this applicant state that he was in no engagement,
nor was he in company with any regular soldiers.

That some time in the month of February - say about 3 or four
weeks before the Battle of Guilford, this applicant was ~~sent~~
with the whole company under the command of Capt. David
May a Militia Captain in Bottetourt County, Virginia, to reinforce
the army under General Green, then lying near, or within a
few miles of Guilford Court House, that he joined Green's army
about the first of March and continued with the same until
three or four days after the battle which took place
on the twentieth of March 1781, that before engagement he recollects
that Captain May deserted his command & went home after which
his company was commanded by an officer by the name of Rolle.
This applicant does not recollect very distinctly the names
of any of his officers except those above mentioned, the time
of his service taken together would make about 7 months in all
these terms being so short, & the time since elapsed so great
that it is out of this applicant's power at this time to give
a very minute history of his service - he would say in
answering the interrogatories required to be propounded by
this Court that he was born in the year 1759 in Dublin

he has no record of his age - at the time of entering the service he resided in Augusta County Virginia, that since the Revolutionary war he lived in South Carolina until about the year 1780 when he removed to Franklin County then in the Territory of Indiana, where continued until he removed to this place where he now resides - For the time & purpose of entering the service he refers to the preceding part of this Declaration - That he has no documentary evidence, & he knows of no person whose testimony he can procure, who can testify to his service - He has been many years partially acquainted with General R. Hannon whom he thinks has some knowledge of his reputation as a military soldier, and has been long intimately acquainted with John all Day who has well understood & believes this applicant to have been a soldier of the Revolution - He is acquainted with no clergyman in this County - He has no pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency of any state or Territory -

Dear Madam:

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 16071, that Robert Carr was born in 1759 in Ireland.

While a resident of Augusta County, Virginia, he enlisted and served five months as a private in Captain Triables' Virginia Company; he enlisted in February, 1781 as a private in Captain David Eacy's or May's Virginia Company and served two months.

After the war, soldier resided in South Carolina until 1810 (not clearly written) then moved to Franklin County, Territory of Indiana.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 2, 1833, while a resident of Marion County, Kentucky, where he had lived but a few months.

Soldier died July 4, 1833.

There are no data relative to his family in the papers in this claim.

The above history is that of the only soldier named Robert Carr, or Karr, who served in the Virginia troops found on the Revolutionary War
