At a Superior Court of Law convened and held for Bedford
County at the courthouse the 15th day of April 1808 before
William Daniel, Judge, two
Jacob Wade came into the court and made oath that
he served twelve months in the continental service of
the United States of America during the revolutionary
war, that he was enlisted in this country under Capt
George Lambeth and belonged to the fourteenth Virginia
Regiment in said Continental service that to the best of
his recollection he enlisted in the year 1777 and that he
was honorably discharged and that from his reduced
circumstances in life he needs the assistance of his
Country for support, that to the best of his knowledge
and belief the discharge he obtained on quitting the
army is lost or is not now in existence that he knows
of which was supported by the affidavit of John Will of
this County who appeared in court and made oath that
the said Jacob Wade was in the continental service of
the United States of America during the revolutionary
war that he belonged to Capt George Lambeth's company
of the fourteenth Virginia Regiment, that he thinks the said
Wade served twelve months in the said service and believes
he was regularly and honorably discharged and that
from his reduced circumstances he thinks he needs
the assistance of his Country for support which is
ordered to be certified.

Testifying whereof I have caused to set my
hand and affixed my seal (having no seal of
office) this first tenth day of April in the
year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred
and eighteen.

Clerk, and that I have full confidence in the
truth of the facts which are so set forth as aforesaid

Secretary of War of the United States under my
hand and seal (there being no seal or Office) this
the sixteenth day of April One thousand
Eight hundred and eighteen.

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your request for the records of Revolutionary War soldiers, Isaac and Jacob Wade, of Bedford County, Virginia, who served in the 14th Virginia Regiment.

The data which follow were abstracted from papers on file in pension claim, W.6389, based on the Revolutionary War service of Isaac Wade.

The date and place of his birth and the names of his parents are not shown.

Isaac Wade enlisted February 12, 1777, place not stated, and served one year as private in Captain George Lambert's Company in the 14th Virginia Regiment and was in the battles of Blandywine and Germantown. He enlisted in August, 1781, in the Bedford County, Virginia militia, was at the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown and was discharged soon afterward.

He married in Bedford County, Virginia, February 11, 1779, Polly who was the widow of Thomas Stevens. Her maiden name was Polly Gibbs.

Isaac Wade died August 9, 1823, in Bedford County, Virginia.

His widow, Polly, was allowed pension on her application executed May 4, 1839, at which time she was seventy-eight years of age and was a resident of Bedford County, Virginia.

Jeremiah, the eldest child of Isaac and Polly Wade, was born January 18, 1780.

William W. Stevens, son of the widow, Polly, was born in October, 1775, and was living in Bedford County, Virginia, in 1839. In that year one Mary E. Wade, daughter of Samuel Mitchell, was living in Bedford County, Virginia, her relationship not shown.

The papers in this claim contain no further data relative to the soldier's family.

The data which follow were abstracted from papers on file in the pension claim, S.41290, based on the Revolutionary War service of Jacob Wade.

The date and place of birth of Jacob Wade and the names of his parents are not shown.

Jacob Wade enlisted in 1777 in Bedford County, Virginia, and served twelve months in Captain George Lambert's Company in the 14th Virginia Regiment.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 15, 1818, in Bedford County, Virginia. His age when he applied for pension was not given.

The papers in this claim contain no data relative to the family of Jacob Wade and it is not stated that he was the brother of Isaac Wade whose record is given above.
