On this 16th day of July 1819, before me, the subscriber, one of the
Judge of the Superior Court for the
said district, personally appeared Moses Wade aged 61
years, resident in Wilkes County in the said district, who, being by me first duly

sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain
the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons en-
gaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war:" That he, the
said Moses Wade enlisted for the term of three years
on the day of January in the year 1777

in Hanover County in the state of Virginia in the company commanded by
Captain John Winston of the Regiment commanded by Colonel
Charles Lewis in the line of the State of Virginia

on the Continental Establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service
of the United States, until the year 1780, when he was

discharged from service in Philadelphia state of Pennsylvania

that he was in the battles of Brandywine Germantown,

Powderhook and at the last mentioned place received

a wound in his thigh, and at Elkhornmouth

and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support,

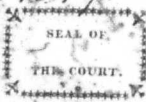
and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.

Sworn to and declared before me, the day and year aforesaid.

I, Benjamin Porter Judge, &c. as aforesaid, do certify that it appears,
to my satisfaction, that the said Moses Wade did serve in the
revolutionary war, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy, for the term
of nine months at one time, on the continental establishment; and I now transmit the proceedings
and testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Department of War, pursuant to the
directions of the aforementioned act of Congress. I am also satisfied that he needs the assistance
of his country for support.

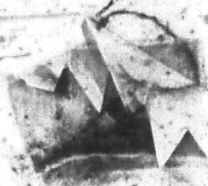

Declaration is contradictory and
requires explanation - applicant
states he was at battle of Monmouth
(June 78) & yet he was discharged Jan 78.

Declaration must be made
before a "judge" If the judge is
satisfied that the applicant served
as the law requires & that from his
recorded circumstances he needs
the assistance of his country - his
certificate to that effect should be
furnished. or if the declaration is
made in open court then open
in like manner should accompany
the case which is certified by the
Clerk. Seal of Court to be affixed
in all cases except when the
Clerk certifies there is none.

Georgia Personally appeared before me
William County { Thomas Anderson a Justice of the
Peace for said County } Moses Wade
in January 1799

and deponent & saith That he enlisted, as a regular
Soldier in the revolutionary ^{war} in the County of Hamour
& State of Virginia ^{under} by John Johnson Lieut in Capt
John Winstons Company in the 14th Virginia Regt,
in the Continental establishment
Commanded by Col^l Charles Lewis & that he fought
in behalf of the United States at the Battle of
Brandywine and at German Town and also
at the place called Bargain point or Powderhook
there he deponent he rec^d a Bayonet wound in the
thigh from the enemy and further that he was engaged
in the Battle at Monmouth and in the month
of ~~January~~ ^{January} Seventeen Hundred & Seventy Eight he
was honorably discharged by Capt John Winston
in Philadelphia ~~on the 14th of 1778~~
and after returning home he performed four
Tours of duty in the Militia one of them was at
Little York at the taking of Lord Cornwallis

And that he is now in very indigent circum-
stances and stands in need of assistance from his

Dear Madam:

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 38456, that Moses Wade or Waide enlisted in January 1777 in Hanover County, Virginia, served as a private in Captain John Winston's Company, Colonel Charles Lewis' Virginia Regiment, was in the battles of Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth and Paulus Hook where he received a bayonet wound in his thigh and was discharged in January 1780. He later performed four tours of duty in the militia, one of them at the taking of Lord Cornwallis, names of officers not given.

He was allowed pension on his application executed February 17, 1819 while a resident of Wilkes County, Georgia, aged about sixty-one years.

There are no family data.

A careful search of the records of this bureau fails to show a claim for pension on file on account of the services of Nathaniel Statham who is reported a pensioner of Stewart County, Georgia, on the Census of Pensioners of 1840.

As said volume was compiled from the returns of the marshalls of the several judicial districts under the Act for taking the Sixth Census and without reference to the records of this bureau, it is not always possible to verify the data contained therein.
