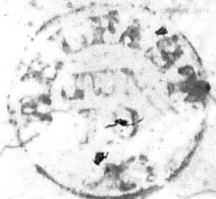

Herewith you will receive the Application of John Wade for a Pension & as the papers have been returned he has been to much trouble & expense to furnish evidence & has succeeded so far that I have no doubt that the Department will be satisfied that his first declaration is substantially true. He was mistaken in the name of one of his colonels & also in the year he was in command of the Winchester. He served in command of the Winchester by the name of Snell Wade the reasons for which he assumed that name is given in his Affidavit taken by me & that he is the same man that served there is proved by the deposition of John Stedley who said him at work in command of that Troop.

I send you the papers of Henry George which were returned that he might prove by the Certificate of the Secretary of Mass. that he was a non commissioned Officer part of the time he was in the service as he declares in his declaration in this he has stated the rolls he describes not being found in the Sumner's Office. Depositions are produced which prove distinctly that he was in the service as he states but do not prove that he was a Sargent. I think the Department will be likely to give him the pay of a private if no more ~~to be paid~~. John Wades name is borne on an "Abstract Pay Roll for Mileages & Days Pay for Capt. Nelsons Company from Fort Edward to Plymouth & up adjacent Towns by way of Albany, Dec^r 1775, where he is allowed for 270 Miles travel £ 2 = 0 = 6

John Wades name is borne on an "Abstract of the Company belonging to Capt. Nelson in Col. Aaron Wallards Regt for their Travel from their places of Abode to Shennsborough, by the way of No. 4, or Charleston, at 1 penny for Mile and one days pay for every 20 Miles," where he is allowed for 231 Miles

John Wade claims for further services under Capt. Sam^l Stockbridge, in 1775; but the roll, after the 1st of August in 1775, is not found in this Office.

John Wade claims for services under Capt. Nelson, in 1776; but the rolls are not found in this Office except those mentioned. —

John Wade claims for services on board the Sloop Winthrop, Capt. George Little Commander, in 1781. It appears that the said Sloop, in 1782, was owned and fitted out by the State of Massachusetts, and was Commanded by Capt. George Little; but his rolls for 1781 are not found in this Office.

I John Huckle of Monmouth am applicant for a

proves this term of service. The certificate of the
Secretary of Massachusetts also proves a year but
not all of it I am very confident that I served
in Capt. Stettricks company not less than eight
months. The second term of service under
Capt. Nelson is a part of it proved by the certificate
of the Secretary of State of Mass. in the length of
this term of service although it is not all proved by
the Secretary's certificate. I am very positive I am
not mistaken & that this term of service was not
less than eight months as stated in my declaration.
Some time after I left the army of the U. S. I went
as a common sailor in board of an American
Merchantman from Boston to Guadalupe I then
to St. Domingo then in our way back to Guadalupe
we were taken by a British armed vessel & carried
into St. Christopher & put in prison. Soon after it
was released from prison & having no other means
there to get along I entered on board of a British
Merchantman & soon after was taken on board of
a British armed vessel, here I remained about
three months & then run away & got back to Boston
& there I entered into the Service of the United
States in board of the Merchantman as described in
my declaration I enlisted into this service by the name
of Israel Wade in order that I might not be known
should I be again taken by a British vessel. I state in
my declaration that I served on board of the Merchantman
in 1781 - it might have been in 1782. In proof of
this I will produce the certificate of the Secretary

of State of Massachusetts & I declare I am the
identical man that served on board of Minutep
as a seaman & Carpenter mate by the name of Jesse
Wade. The length of this service I do think was
eight months but in this I may be mistaken the
certification does not prove quite so much - but
I am confident I am not mistaken in the length
of the two first terms. I further declare that
there is no Cleggman living in the neighborhood
where I live
