p. 319. "My ancestor, James Chappell, the youngest of the 4 sons of Thomas Chappell, 2nd, and Elizabeth Jones, became the wealthiest and most prominent of the brothers and outlived them all by many years. He was born in 1694 in the part of Charles City County that afterwards, in 1702, became Prince George County.

The first record of him is found in Prince George County, Virginia: 'I, James Chappell, so hereby acknowledge to have received of James Jones, all the part of my deceased father, Thomas Chappell's Estate, both real and personal, left by his will that was due and belonging to me and was put and placed in the hands of the said James Jones, and I do hereby acquit, release and discharge the said Jas. Jones and his heirs forever from every part and parcel of the same. Witness my hand and seal this the 10th day of May, A.D. 1715.'

Jas. Chappell was named for his grandfather, Jas. Jones. He and his brother, Samuel, removed to Surry County, where in 1725 James Patented 235 acres of land. (See land Offc. in Richmond, Vol. 12, p. 262). He afterwards patented large tracts of land in Surry and Sussex, as shown by records.

The first wife of James, and the mother of his children, was Elizabeth Howell, dau. of Thomas Howell. His second wife was also named Elizabeth. His first wife died Sept. 20, 1744, the 2nd wife died July 11, 1762. James Chappell was Seventy-five years old when he died in Sussex, Feb. 12, 1769, leaving a large estate in lands and negroes. His Will was proved 16 March, 1769, mentions 4 sons as executors-James, Thomas, Howell and John; mentions 6 married daughters-Elizabeth Mason, Mary Gee, Sarah Mason, Rebecca Rothington, Amy Smith, Lucretia Carter; grandsons, Thomas and Howell Tatum, children of a daughter deceased; James Chappell, son of James; Mary, daughter of Thomas. (Book "B" p. 193) "

(GAR) There were 4 Thomas', the 4th one, Rev. sol., Mrs. Pleasant's line)

p. 318. "Capt. Jno. Chappell, master of the 'Speedwell', came to Virginia in 1635, but did not remain. His son, Thomas, (Thos. 1st above), came later in the same year on the ship 'America'. He was 23 years old. Thomas Chappell only remained at Jamestown a few days, proceeding up the river about 30 miles he located on the south side of Charles City County opposite Westover, at the mouth of a creek named for him, 'Chappell Creek'. It is thought that he was a near relative of Capt. Wm. Barker, master of the 'America', as he settled on a very desirable tract of land belonging to Capt. Barker, and married the daughter of Lieut. Jno. Bannister". (See Va. Historical Index.)

Thomas Chappell had only 2 children, a son and a daughter. Thomas Chappell, 2nd was born about 1650. He m. Elizabeth, dau. of Jas. Jones, by whom he had 4 sons and a daughter. The sons were Samuel, Thomas, James and Robert; the dau. m. Jno. Williams. Thomas Chappell, 2nd, died between 1694 and 1700. There is a land patent showing that he was granted 423 acres of land in Charles City County in 1694, and that he had bought nine African slaves." "His father-in-law Jas. Jones, of Prince George County, was a man of wealth, as his will is still preserved, dated, 1719."

There is mention of: "Chappell Genealogy" By: Phil. E. Chappell, but I have not seen it.

There is in the book, "Relique of the Rives" By: Jas. Rives Childs, mention of the Chappell and Tatum families, p. 454 Chappell and p. 430 Tatum. I have not seen it myself, tho' I have had excerpts therefrom, but have written to Mr. Childs, Dept. of State, Washington, D.C., Apr. 15, 1937.

COMPENDIUM OF AMERICAN GENEALOGY: Vol. V, p. 117

Chappell Coat of Arms and the write-up of Chas. Thompson Chappell, b. May, 19, 1899:

"10- Thomas Chappell (1612-post 1665) from England in the 'America', 1635, settled in Charles City Co., Va.; m. ca 1648, a dau. of Lt. Jno. Bannister.
9- Thomas Chappell-1650-ca-1700 of Charles City Co., Va.; m. Elizabeth Jones, (James)." GAR

Vol. V. p. 589. Write-up of Clara Weston Chappell (Mrs. Chas. E. Bryan):

"9-Capt. Jno. Chappell, owner and master of the ship 'Speedwell', sister ship of the 'Mayflower'; sailed May 28, 1635, and landed at Jamestown.

8- Thomas Chappell (1612-post 1665) came in the 'America', 1635, located opposite Westover, nr old Merchants Hope Ch.; received land grant from Sir Wm. Berkley; Chappell's Creek was named for him. m. ca 1648, a dau. of Lt. Jno. Bannister."

7-Thomas, (1650-1700), of Chappell Plantation; m. Eliz. Jones (James)."

Note: There were Thos. Chappells, 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th in the write-up in the Wm. and Mary, Vol. 9, (2) 318-20. We find on p. 428 of Vol. V. Comp. of Am. Ge. that "Mary Briggs m. 1745 her cousin, Thos. Chappell." So, there seems to be 2 connections with the Briggs' and Chappells, as Jas. Chappell, father of Thos. Chappell, 2nd, m. for his 2nd wf., Eliz. Briggs.

2. "James Chappell - Will Sussex County, Oct. 31, 1768 and died 2, 1769 - will probated Mar. 16, 1769.
He m. Eliz., dau. of Henry Briggs. She died Sept. 20, 1744, Surry Co." Issue:

This death date is the same as given for Eliz. Howell, 1st wf. of James Chappell, and "the mother of his children" as given in Wm. and Mary (2nd S), Vol. 9, pp 318-19-20. We have that Eliz. Briggs d. July 11, 1762.
