until the Exposition to France.

John Tunstal, Bishop of Durham, from

After this disposition, it came again into
the hands of the Crown and was
granted by the protection Somerset,
temp. Edward VI, to the Earl of Shrewsbury
"Shrewsbury House" in November 1593
In 1593, it ceased to be a
private house and it was let as
TENEMENTS. Now says TENEMENTS
were Bishop's house at
