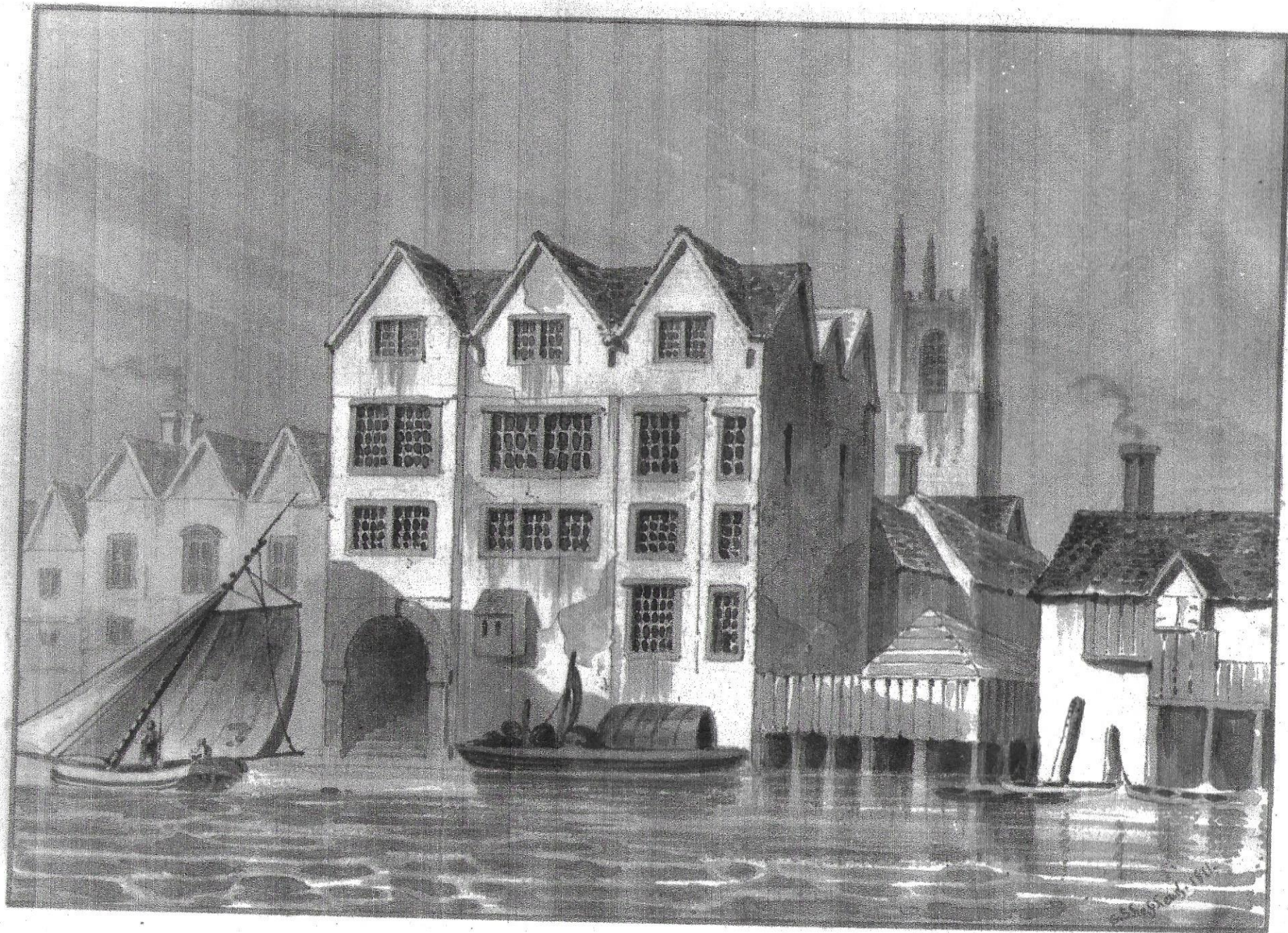

PRIVATE RESIDENCE.

SEPT. MILANESE ENVOY TO BURGUNDIAN COURT,
WAS TOLD BY DUKE CHARLES THAT
EDWARD IV HAD GIVEN ORDERS FOR THE
SAILORS TO TROW HIS FORMER BROTHER
IN. LAW OVERBOARD.

AFTER BARNET, HE STAYED AT WESTMINSTER
ABBEY BEFORE BEING MOVED TO THE TOWER,
UNTIL THE EXPEDITION TO FRANCE.

• AFTER 1485 and FOR THE REST of
HER LIFE, Lady MARGARET's LONDON
RESIDENCE was COLMANBURN, THAT
VARI STOWS-BUILT "INN" ON THE THAMES
WHICH IN 12th CENTURY HAD BELONGED TO HER
COUSIN, THE DUKE of EXETER.

AFTER HIS DISPOSITION, IT CAME AGAIN INTO
THE HANDS OF THE CROWN AND WAS
GRANTED BY THE PROTECTOR SOMERSET,
TEMP. EDWARD VI, TO THE EARL OF SUMMERSEY
"SUMMERSEY HOUSE" IN NOVEMBER 1593

IN 1593, IT CEASED TO BE A
PRIVATE HOUSE AND IT WAS LET AS
TENEMENTS.
