6-Maj. John Stevenson (1728-98), believed to have come from Ireland, 1740; settled in Augusta Co., Va.; served in Indian wars; maj. in Gen. George Rogers Clark's Ill. Regt., 1778-83; m Miss Warwick (killed by Indians, ante Am. Rev.);

5-Samuel (1744-1825), to Lexington, Ky., 1779; a founder of Pisgah, Ky. and gave land to Pisgah ch., said to have been 1st ch. in Ky. and has never closed doors since; pvt. in Am. Rev.; m Jane Gay (John's, settled on the Cow Pasture River, Augusta Co., m Jean Warwick);

4-James (1742-1864), m 1805, Ann Galloway (William's (1743-95), Am. Rev., of Cumberland Co., Pa., removed to Paris, Ky., m 1777, Rebecca Mitchell; George's, from Ireland to Phila., Pa., settled in Cumberland Co.);

3-Jane Gay (1808-87), m Vincent KING (3 above);

2-William Harrison (1840-1923), served in Co. F, 34th Ohio Vol. Inf., 1861-64; millwright; m 1865, Bertha Louise Ritter (1842-1912); issue: I-Minna Genieve (1866-69); II-Harry Ritter (1869-74); III-Roy Stevenson (1 above); IV-Bertha Dot (1879; m Edwin G. Fitzgerald); V-Ruby (1885-94).

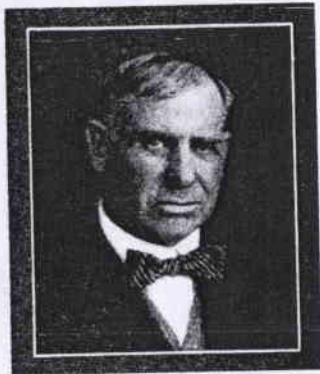
