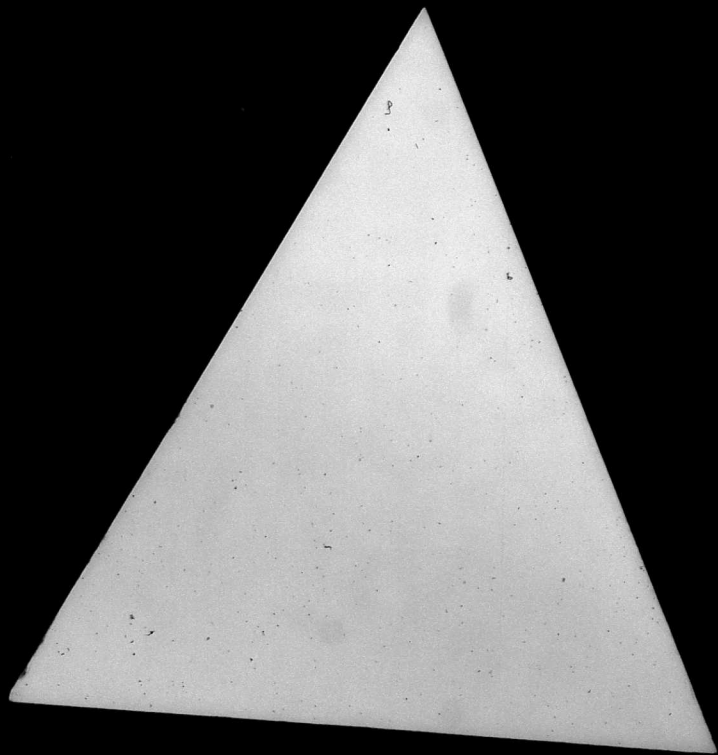

- 5th. The Ordinary must see to it that each bill is properly legitimated in every respect, and properly sworn to, and all attached thereto to this blank, after this blank has been properly completed as indicated.
- 6th. The completed voucher with blank and the bill—must be sent to the Pension Department for approval and no money must be paid out until it is returned to you as your authority to make the payment.
- 7th. The Ordinary signs may sell, as Ordinary, for the pensioner and then disburse the money himself and take receipt.
- 8th. Accept no bills for services until you write the Pension Department, stating the circumstances, in very great detail. Pensioner's ability, or childlessness, must not charge the State for doing only what the law and common humanity demand of them.
- 9th. Return this application, and attached bills, with your final settlement to the Pension Department.
- 10th. Ordinary should see that the back of this blank, when folded, is filled out.

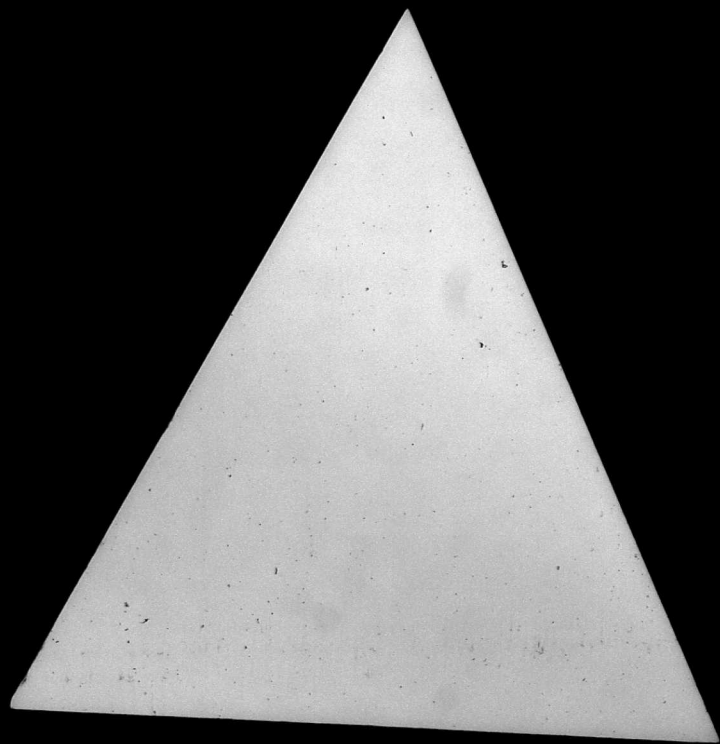

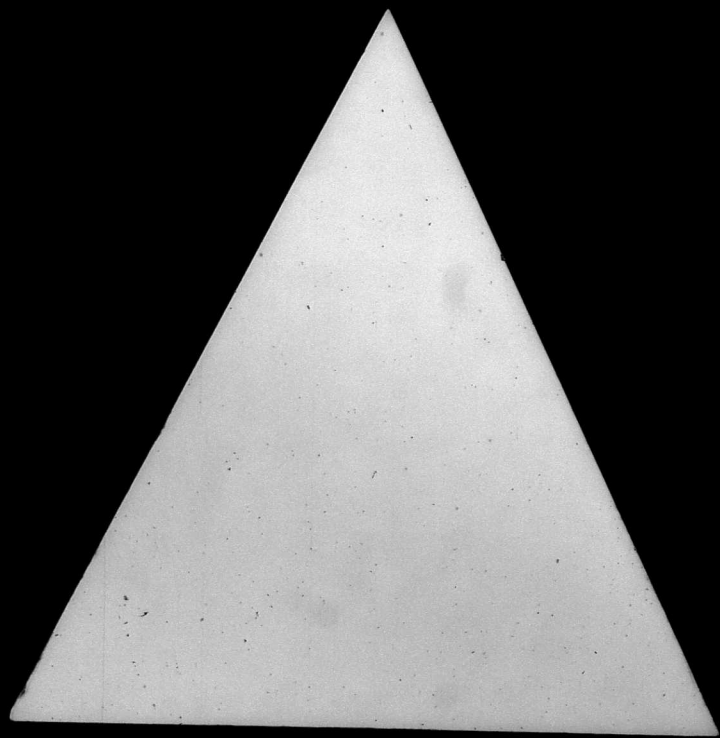
