- 7th. The Ordinary signs payroll, as Ordinary, for the pension and then disburses the money himself and takes receipts.
- 8th. Do not pay him for services until you write the Pension Office, stating the circumstances in very great detail.
- 9th. Pensioner's children, or children-in-law, must not charge the State for doing only what the law and common humanity demand of them.
- 10th. Return this application, and attached bills, with your final settlement to the Pension Office.
- 11th. Ordinary should see that the back of this blank, when filled in, is filed out.
- 12th. Funeral expenses of deceased "over" pensioners covering all or part of both the 1860 and 1861 pensions require two separate sets of this voucher and bills—one set to be filed in the Pension Office with the pension papers of each year.

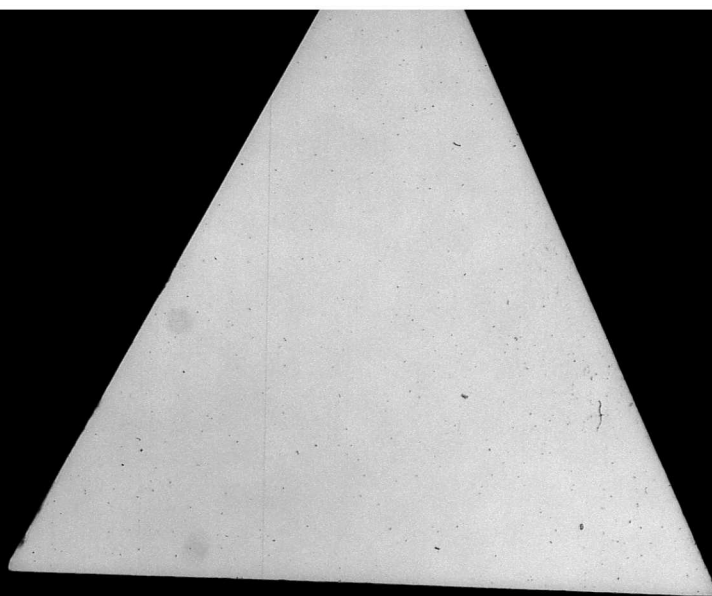
