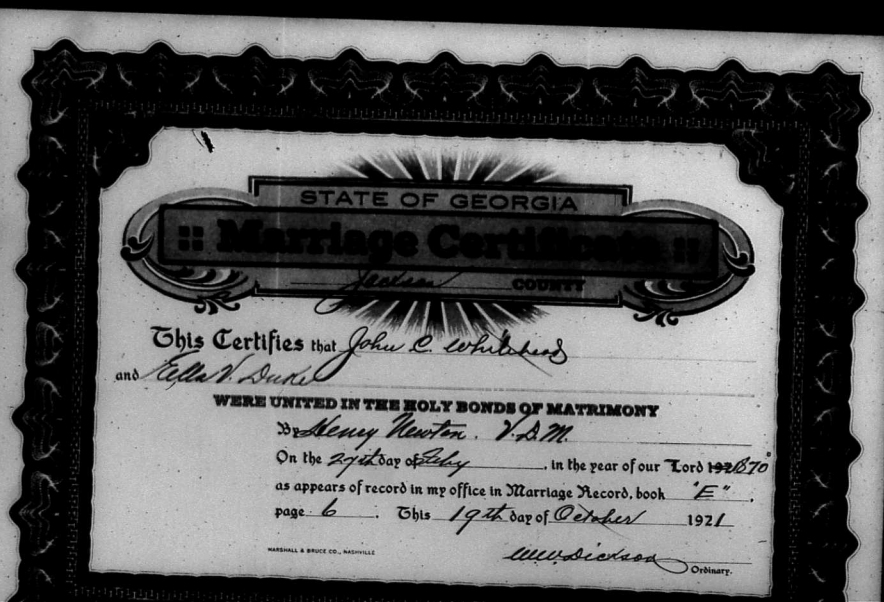

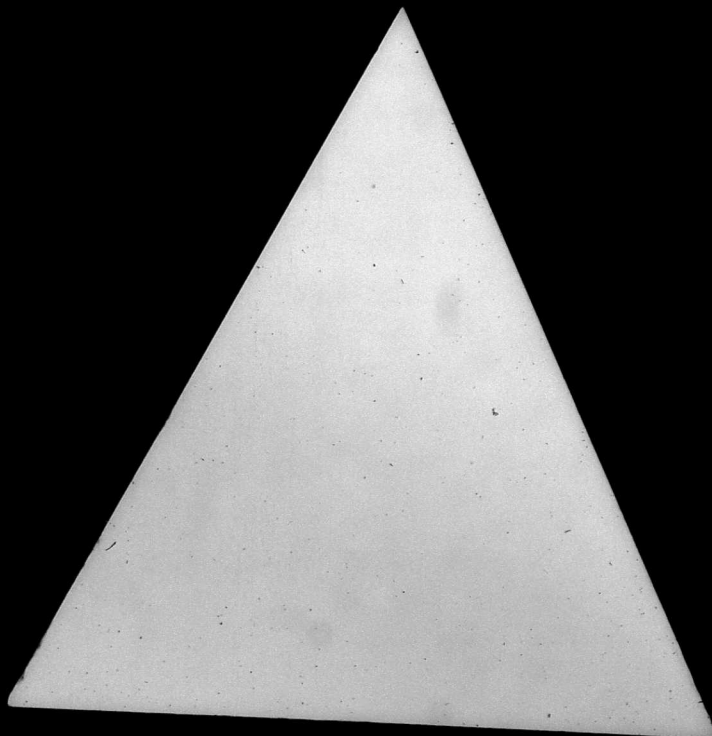
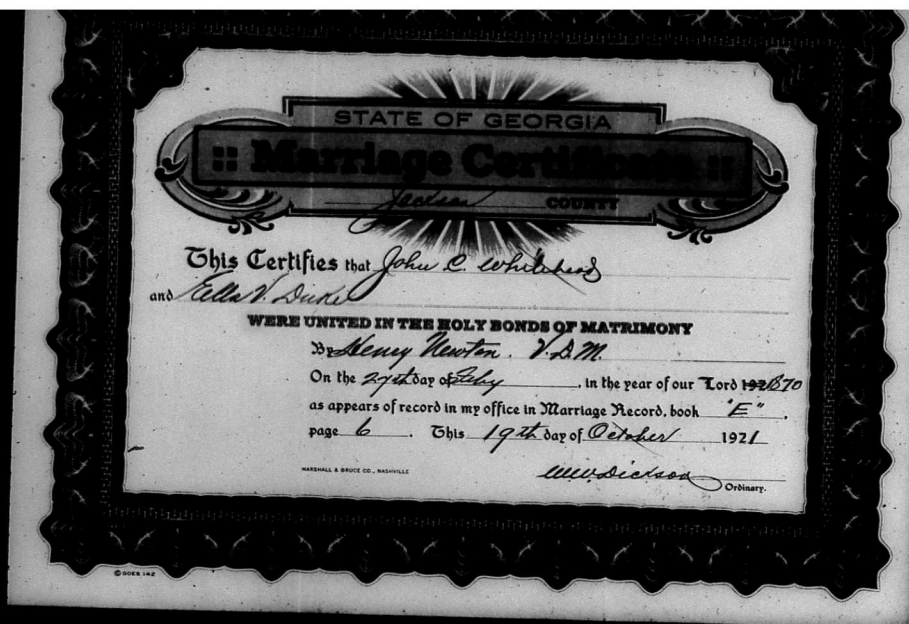

The widow of a soldier, if she is living, has prior claim in this instance those claiming accounts for expenses of last illness, and expenses of funeral, to make out their account and submit same, giving each item and the value of it, and each date.  
2nd. Pension accounts cannot be paid—only those connected with the last illness, just before death when pensioner grew weak to die.  
3rd. Each account must be sworn to before the Ordinary, and in the following form: (Do not use the terms "just, true, due, unpaid," etc.)  
"The above and foregoing account is rendered for services in the last illness (or for funeral expenses, as the case may be) of \_\_\_\_\_ who died without owing sufficient property to pay this bill."  
4th. The Ordinary must see to it that each bill is perfectly legitimate in every respect, and properly sworn to, and all attached ready to fill blanks after this blank has been properly completed as indicated.  
5th. The completed voucher, this blank and the bill, must be sent to the Pension Office for approval and no money must be paid out until it is returned for use as your authority to make the payment.  
6th. The Ordinary signs pay-roll as Ordinary, for the pension and then disburses the money himself and takes receipt. He accepts no bills for funeral until you write the Pension Office, stating the circumstances in very great detail.  
7th. Pensioner's children, or children-in-law, must not charge the State for doing only what the law and common humanity demand of them.  
8th. Return this application, and attached bills, with your final settlement to the Pension Office.  
9th. Ordinary should see that the back of this blank, when filled, to fill out.  
10th. Funeral expenses of deceased pensioners covering all or part of both the 1920 and 1921 pensions require two separate sets of this voucher and bills—one set to be filed in the Pension Office with the pension papers of each year.
