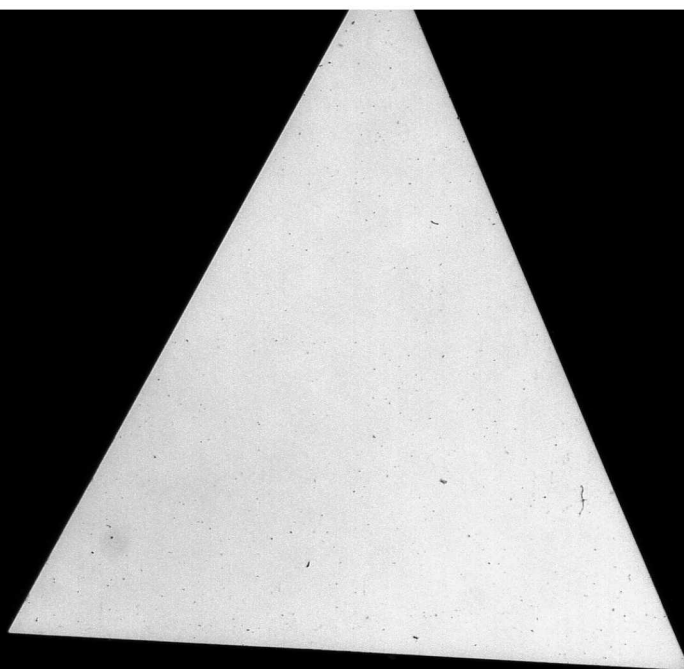

I have your request for the file in this case, and for my comments on the file.

The file is attached herewith.

The applicant claims to have been a member of a South Carolina command during the Civil War. The Georgia pension cannot be granted to a soldier, nor to his widow, if the command in which he served was a military organization of some other State, unless it be clearly shown that such command was a part of the Confederate States Army, the idea being that the Army represented the interests of all of the States, collectively, whereas, soldiers not connected with the Army were for local defense alone, and their service imposed no pension obligation upon the State of Georgia.

My disapproval of this application was based upon the failure of applicant to show that the command to which he belonged was connected with the Confederate States Army.

The original application has been amended. It is still impossible to approve it.

The Adjutant-General of the United States states that Company C, 2nd Battalion Cavalry, South Carolina Reserves, known as Spartan Rangers, was a part of the Confederate States Army, and that Wilkins was Captain of that Company. This brings that Company within the Georgia pension law.

The Adjutant-General of the United States says:

"... no record of service, capture or parole of a man named John Dixon Smith as a member of the above mentioned organization (Company C) has been found."

The applicant did not answer, fully, Question 4 in the application. The name of the Captain and the letter of the Company, alone, does not identify the command. Applicant claims to have served in a Company B, of which Wilkins was Captain. It appears that Wilkins was not Captain of Company B, if there was a Company B in the command to which The Adjutant-General refers, but that Wilkins was Captain of Company C in that command.

I have an application with the pension commissioner of Georgia for a pension of a Confederate Veteran from the Civil War. This application has been refused by Judge John J. Hunt.

Two affidavits were made by each one of the witnesses, Chamblin and O'Dell. They claim to have served with applicant. In their first affidavits, they designate the command as "3rd Regiment, South Carolina Cavalry." In their affidavits, submitted later, they designate the command as "2nd Battalion Cavalry," etc.

Each of these two witnesses, in his second affidavit, contradicts some of the testimony contained in his first affidavit, which does not inspire confidence in any of their testimony. Furthermore, the first affidavits of these two witnesses were made before the letter from The Adjutant-General was received. The designation of the command by the Adjutant-General did not coincide with the designation of the command in the first affidavits. The designation of the command in the second affidavits conforms to the designation contained in the letter of The Adjutant-General, which letter is dated just prior to the dates of these second affidavits.

The applicant and his witnesses do not agree as to the length of time he served. Applicant claims: "Seven or eight months." Chamblin and O'Dell give "... fall of 63" as the time of his enlistment. Chamblin states, positively, that the service continued until the end of the War, and O'Dell makes the same statement, to the best of his knowledge and belief. Not less than six months of actual military service must be stated and proven, and, also, "an honorable accounting until the end of the War," except in case of a soldier who enlisted less than six months before the end of the War, in a Georgia command, and served therein until the end of the War.

A joint affidavit is on file, supporting applicant's claim that his absence from his command at the end of the War was due to illness.

Until a soldier's memory is too poor to enable him to make an intelligent application for pension ~~which~~ he should remember, perfectly, the military designation of the command in which he served. While a soldier's memory remains at all intact, he should remember perfectly the military designation of the command in which he served. Next to remembering his own name, he should remember that.

A soldier should be able to very closely approximate the dates of his enlistment and discharge.

To summarize: Applicant has not stated and proven in what Company and Regiment he enlisted, giving the arm and class of service, and the names of the Colonel and Captain. It is, therefore, impossible to determine that he was a soldier during the Civil War, and that he was connected with the Confederate States Army.

Applicant is a native of South Carolina, but he has been a citizen of Georgia for more than twenty-four years. Since the property restrictions as to the granting of a pension were removed, effective January 1st, 1920, applicant has been eligible to a pension, upon proper showing as to his military service. His application was not filed until the year 1931. For more than ten years, he has refrained from making application. It is not unreasonable to assume that testimony would have been more available ten years ago than it is now, and that it would have been of a better character, in that the minds of the witnesses would have been clearer at that time.

It should be noted that after the first affidavits had been made, the letter from The Adjutant-General was received. The designation of the command by The Adjutant-General did not correspond with the designation in the affidavits. The designation of the command shown in the second affidavits, which affidavits bear dates subsequent to the date of the letter from The Adjutant-General, corresponds exactly with designation in the letter of The Adjutant-General.

The applicant and his witnesses do not agree as to the length of time he served. Applicant claims: "Seven or eight months." Witnesses, in their first affidavits, give " . . . fall of 63," as the time of enlistment and state that he served until the end of the War, in the case of Chamblin, and that he was at home sick, in the case of O'Dell. Applicant claims that he was sick at the end of the War.

A joint affidavit is on file, supporting applicant's claim as to absence from command at the end of the War being due to illness.

While a soldier's memory remains at all intact, he should remember perfectly the military designation of the command in which he served. Next to remembering his own name, he should remember that.

A soldier should be able to very closely approximate the dates of his enlistment and discharge.

To summarize: Applicant has not stated and proven in what Company and Regiment he enlisted, giving "the arm and class of service, and the names of the Colonel and Captain." It is, therefore, impossible to determine that he was a soldier during the Civil War, and that he was connected with the Confederate States Army.

Applicant is a native of South Carolina, but he has been a citizen of Georgia for more than twenty-four years. Since the property restrictions as to the granting of a pension were removed, effective January 1st, 1920, applicant has been eligible to a pension, upon proper showing as to his military service. His application was not filed until the year 1931. For more than ten years, he has refrained from making application. It is not unreasonable to assume that testimony would have been more available ten years ago than it is now, and that it would have been of a better character, in that the minds of the witnesses would have been clearer at that time.

3.

The applicant is a native of South Carolina, but he states that he has been a citizen of the State of Georgia for more than twenty-four years. Since the property restriction was removed from the pension law, applicant has been eligible to a pension, upon proper showing as to his military service. His application was not filed until the year 1931. For many years, he has refrained from making application. It is not unreasonable to assume that more and better testimony would have been available to him then than it is now; witnesses would have been more plentiful and their minds would have been clearer.

The file in this case is not sufficient, in either extent or character, to authorize the admission of the applicant to the Georgia pension roll. The defects are not technical but vital.

I am exceedingly sorry that I cannot approve this application.

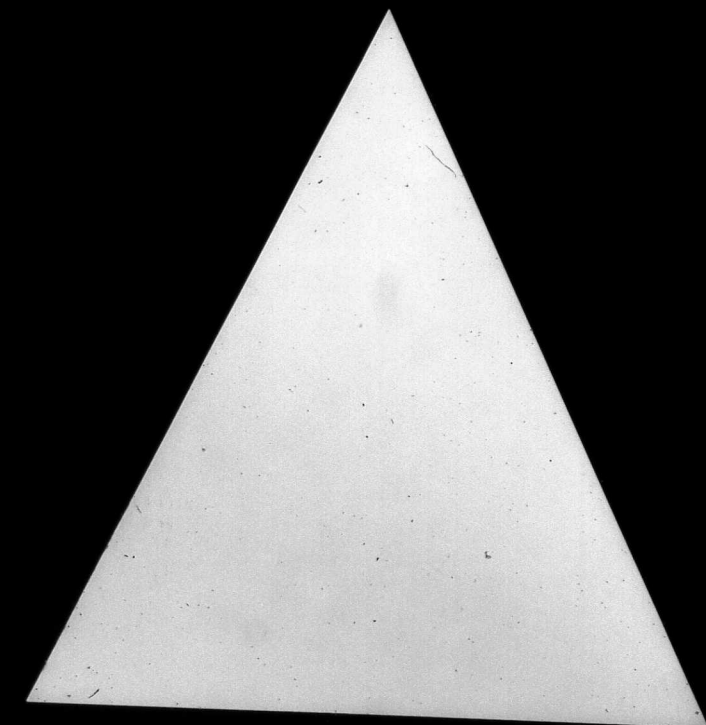

3. It will not answer to say that an arm is "substantially useless for ordinary pursuits of life, etc." There is no qualification to the clause of the Act in reference to the arm or leg, but the limb must for all purposes be "substantially and essentially useless."

4. If the papers are returned for correction and amendments are *added* to any of the affidavits, the amendments must be made *under oath* before an officer, and the proofs must show that the amendments have been duly sworn to.

5. Every application must be certified by the Ordinary of the county of the residence of the applicant, to the Secretary of the other office will not be received in any case.

6. The Ordinaries of all counties are specially requested to call the attention of the physicians and applicants to the provisions of the Act.
