Dear Madam:

Your communication of recent date was received in due time. I have waited to answer this that I might give a careful examination to your application to see if I could do anything for you. You applied for the service of your husband in Co., A-10th Batln., of Ga., Infantry. You failed to state and prove just when he was discharged and from what Command. Your witnesses do not seem to know anything about this service, and I had no basis to locate the service in his Command. You only stated that he enlisted Moh., 62, and your witness, Clayton Jay, knew nothing of this enlistment and service, and your brother, John Price, did not know anything about his enlistment and service only in a general way. You did not state in what Command he enlisted in the 2d time or when he got out of that Command and how. If you can get up some testimony to show somewhere the date he put in his substitute and was discharged from the 10th Batln., and the date he enlisted in the last Command, letter of the Company, and Regiment by number and when he was discharged from that to go into the potash business, maybe I can do something for you, but as the application stands now I am unable to say just what service he performed in the 10th, Batln., and how long, and what service he did in the 2d Command, and how long.

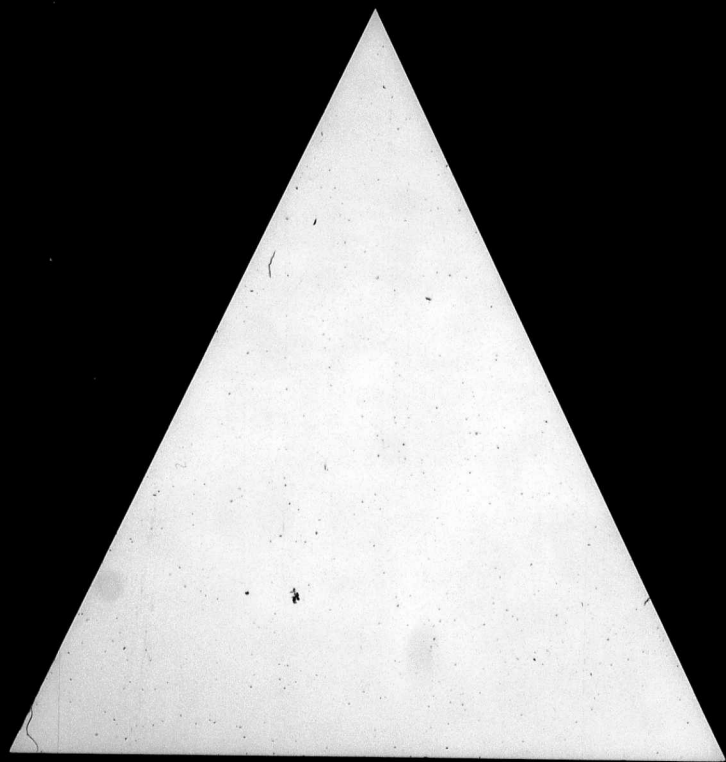

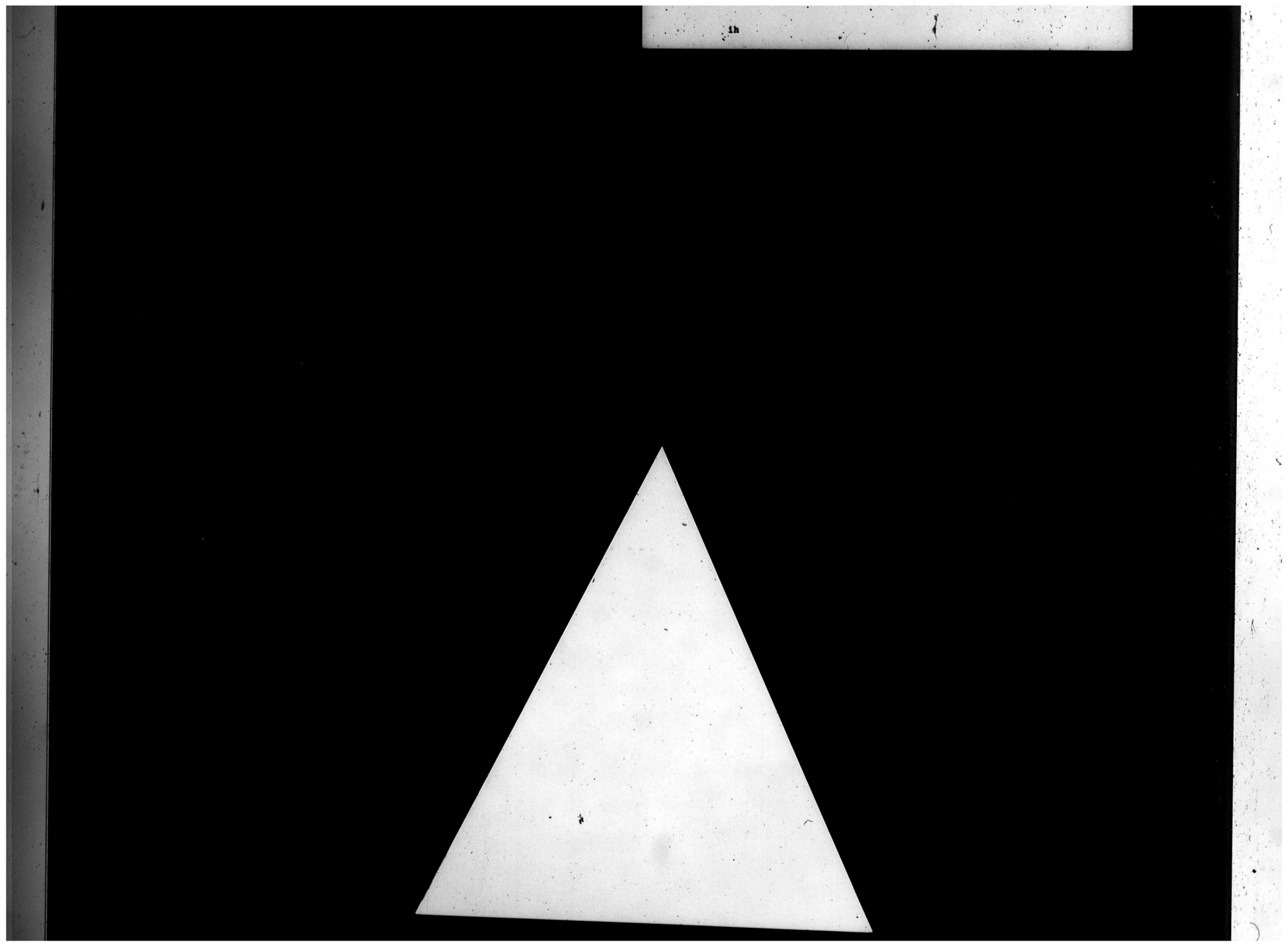

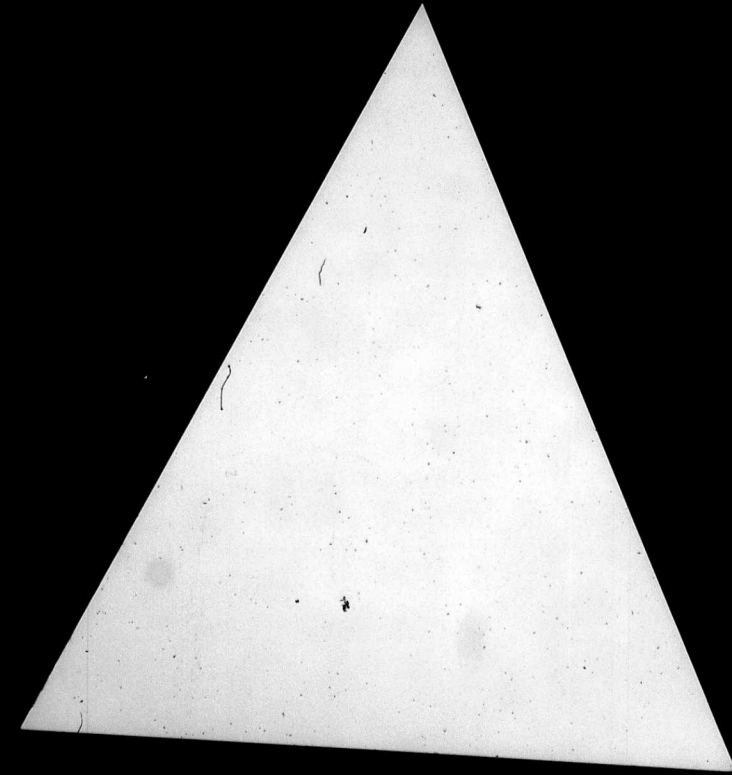
