After you left the office I searched for the application in which you were interested, and find that Mr. J.A. Anderson, Co., C-4th Ga., Cavalry was disapproved for the reason that the War Department's record shows that he deserted on the 16th, of Sept., 1864, by taking oath of allegiance to the U.S. Government. I have the certified record of his service from the War Department which is this:

"Joseph (not found as J.A.) Anderson Pvt., Company C.4 Regt. Ga. Cav. C.S.A., enlisted Sept., 29, 1863. Union Prisoners of War. "Deserted and came to U.S. Navy Fleet of Georgia Sept., 15, 1864 and took oath of allegiance Sept., 16, 1864".

I am sorry that such record comes against any man that lives in Ga., and wants a pension.

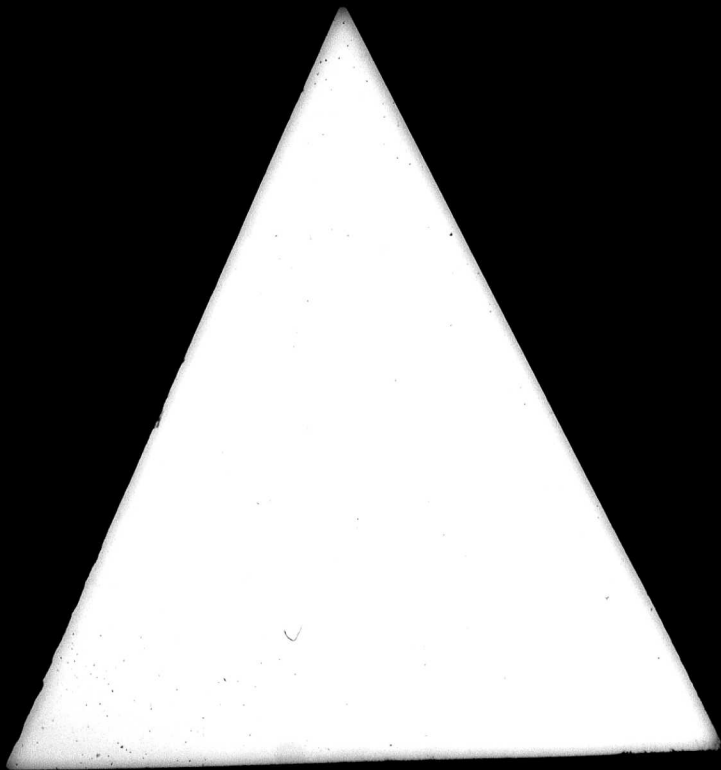

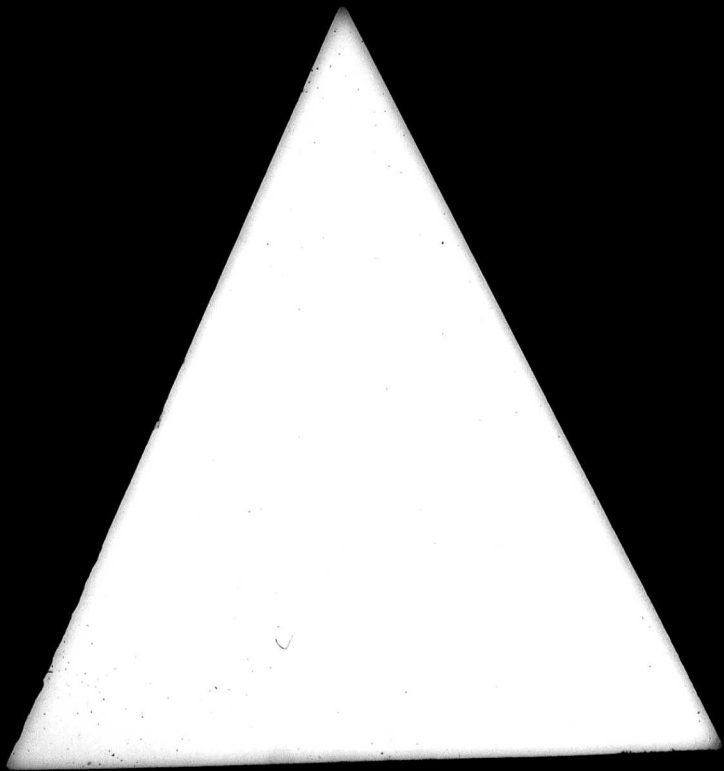
