Beckham in his application for a pension to questions 9 and 10 in said application I wish to say: That not a great many of the men belonging to the company of which Jno. A. J. Beckham and I were members were present at the time the regiment was finally disbanded on April 15, 1865 for the reason that at the time Gen. Lee surrendered the regiment was stationed within a few miles of the homes of most of the men and some of them had been allowed by the officers in command to go home, and a number being absent from the command had enlisted with the militia and were waiting to know what to do. My memory does not serve me well enough after a lapse of 38 years to say positively where Mr. Beckham was, but I am satisfied that he was all right and at his post of duty to the end. Several men deserted from our company towards the last and I remember them well. I am sure that if Mr. Beckham had been among that number I would have known it and would not have forgotten it. His horse was killed by the enemy near Atlanta the day before Sherman entered the city, and upon the happening of that event Beckham was detailed to do duty with the wagon train. I was not with him after that time. I have known Mr. Beckham ever since the commencement of the Civil War. That at the commencement of the Civil War he enlisted in the same company with us and remained attached to that company and in active service through the war. His horse was killed in the battles around Atlanta. He was then detailed to duty with the wagon train. We were separated from the wagon train at Macon about January or February, 1865 and we were not thrown with him thereafter until he reached home after the war. We have lived with him in the same neighborhood ever since the war. There has never been any suggestions from any source that he was unfaithful to the Confederate cause. While there were some few men who deserted from our Company along towards the end of the war, Beckham was not among the number. He was a faithful soldier, and needy and indigent in his old age, and we, his comrades in arms, make this affidavit that he may be allowed the slight bounty of the state because he deserves it.

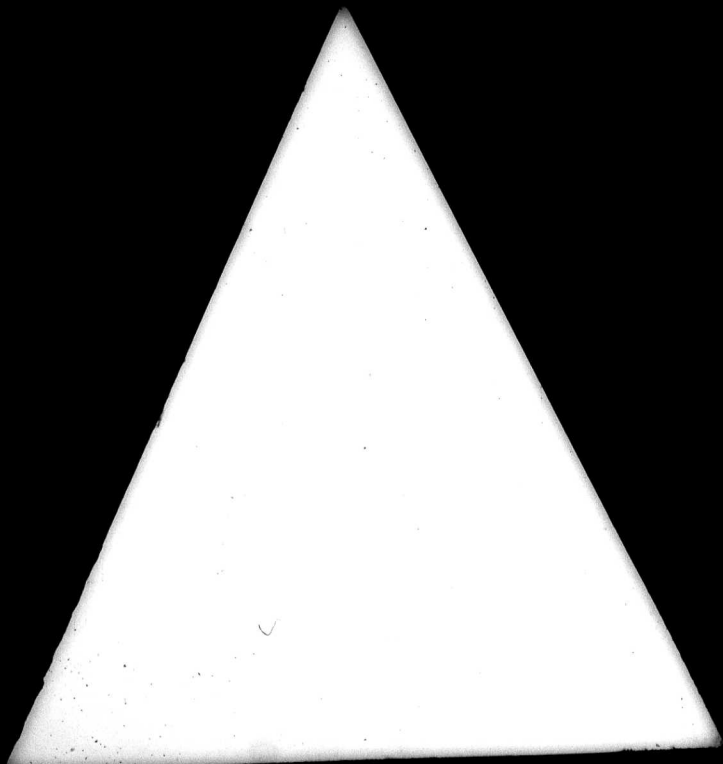

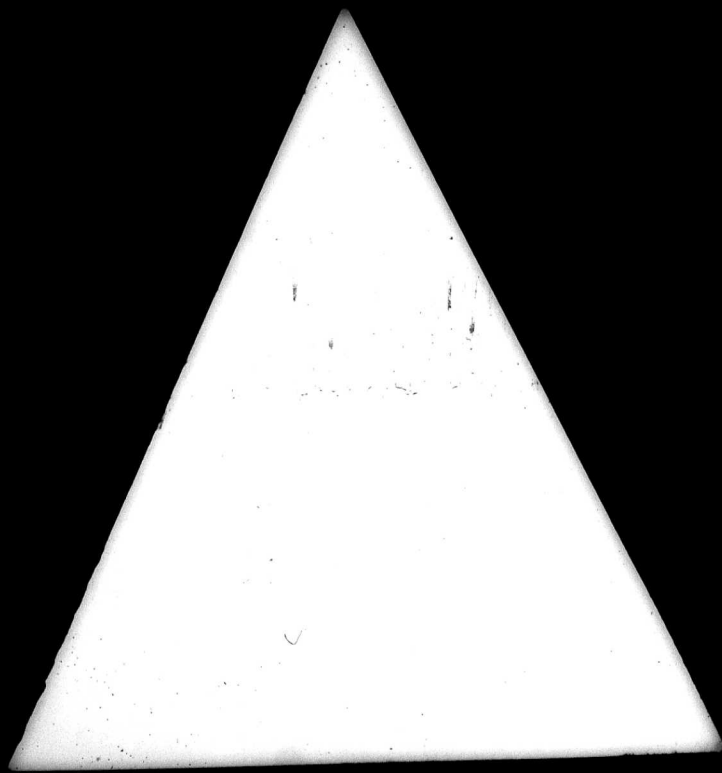

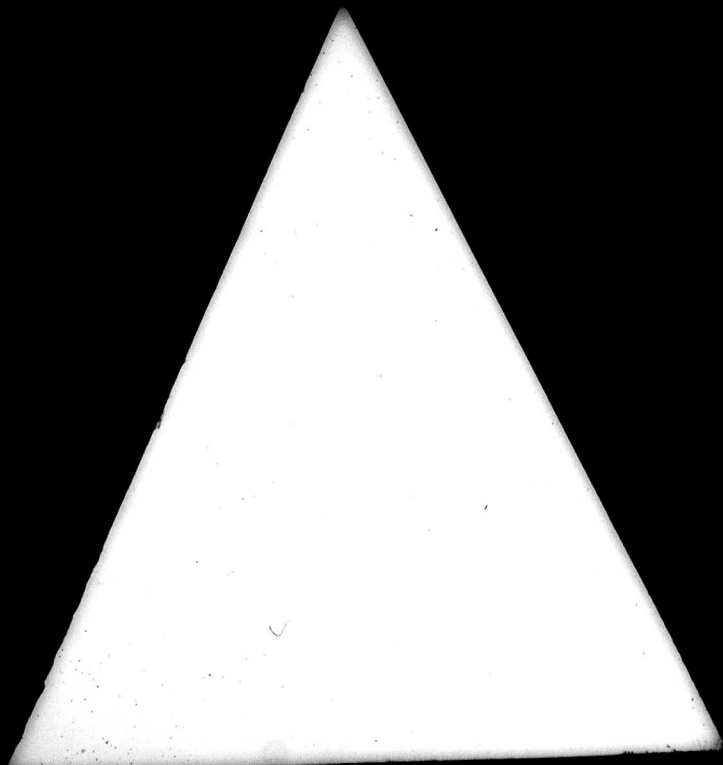
