The Evans Guards after being in Camps nearly 4 weeks were ordered by Gov. Brown to rendezvous at Atlanta to join the 9<sup>th</sup> Reg. Ga. Vol.

Left Washington June 14<sup>th</sup> at one and half past - in the evening, arrived in Atlanta at 12 o'clock that night. Laid on floor of A Hotel until day two went to camp & pitched tents. Elective officers appointed at 8 o'clock. Result Capt. Goulding 1st. Capt. Simplicius 2d. Col. Capt. Morgan Maj. - Bacon appointed Adjutant Dr. Henry M. Andrews Surgeon (Assistant Surg.) Confederate Army.) Rev. H. A. Pupper Chaplain Lt. Watkins Quartermaster.

Left Atlanta

June 15<sup>th</sup> left for Richmond via four Companies at a time. Two by way of Augusta ga. 3 through Tennessee

Evans Guards Left Atlanta

To Augusta 14<sup>th</sup> P. M. arrived there 5 A. M. June 16 laid over until eve. Sunday. Capt. Norman Preached. Beg. in cars in cars at Carolina Depot Left Augusta 7<sup>th</sup> P. M. Arrived at Petersburg 3 A. M. changed Cars & started for Wiliamsburg in box cars at 5 P. M. June 17. Rough ride.

Lost connection and had to stay in Wiliamsburg all night - on a floor of warehouse covered over with muck. Some of us on guard got no supper. for the Balance eat it up while we were on guard. June 18 Left Wiliamsburg 5 A. M. 9 passengers Cars for Weldon N.C. 160 miles sit and drawn by a sorry Engine. All day going. - Stopped at Weldon Depot without much to eat - lay over until 1 A. M. Pumbled June 19 into box cars and off for Petersburg.

Reached Petersburg 8 A.M. Marched with the  
utmost precision for one mile to Richmond  
Depot. Left for Richmond 8 A.M.

Arrived same morning at Richmond with about  
600 men of the 9 Regt. Marched from depot  
to Encampment near Fairfield race course dist-  
from depot about 3½ miles on open field. no shade  
weather hot. wind a little up. Private Pats. Sunes  
took the evening to wash etc.

30 June Began to Drill first in squads then  
Company. (33<sup>rd</sup> quite a storm 3 o'clock R.)  
many tents blown over.

Felt sick with the common Soldier ill. B.C.  
(22<sup>nd</sup> June) Dined with Genl Toombs & Dailey  
Drilling often & on all the time.

Lunday 23. Mustered into Confederate States Service  
At 6 o'clock P.M. By Capt. Tom Taylor afterwards  
Col. of 1<sup>st</sup> Kentucky Regt.

Under our first Confederate orders to march  
Cant get off for want of cars.

The Devin Guards on right of Regt by  
order of oldest Captain and best company.  
Dress Parade on 24<sup>th</sup>

25 orders to march for Winchester 26 & 27 A.M.

Dress Parade at 5½ P.M. 25 day of June.

26 June

Struck Pats & Marched to Depot to take the cars  
for Winchester in the valley of Va. Beautiful  
country all the way, on our passage the Cars broke  
down at Manassas detained there without much  
until 12 M. of 27 of June. We passed through  
the Blue Ridge at Manassas Gap Reaching  
Strasburg at 5 P.M. Camped in clover field  
most of the regt. was waiting for us when we  
arrived detained by breakin. etc.

Reaches Winchester at noon 09<sup>th</sup> day June  
Marched to the east of town and came to camp  
at Col. Barlow's Command

Pitched tents and cooked & washed up.  
Camps were situated in Woods.

Marching orders July 2.

Report that our caravans would have needed at  
Williams fort. Late in afternoon orders came  
to march sun not very high when we started  
one wagon to I Camped.

9<sup>th</sup> Regt was in rear of Bastions Brigade  
halted after dusk east of Rambouillet  
on next morning before sun up Party of  
about 10 soldiers halted in a grove

First thoughts of an Engagement.

Keen we thought we were to be hit by the advancing columns of the Enemy.

But it was only to rest and distract  
Custered. Here to higher air prospect of a fight  
we saw the retreating Baggage of Col. Jackson's  
afterwards Genl. Lee's army. After stopping awhile we  
moved on to Marks'ville picking it at 3 P.M.

July 3<sup>rd</sup> 1861. Here for the first time we formed a line  
of battle.

Line of Battle Rockville July 3<sup>rd</sup> 1861

Marched our Regt in an Apple orchard & slackened  
and in position on the line of Battle,  
ordained to sleep on arms that night.

Artillery came up some was posted in the road  
running middle through the line and some  
towards each ~~end~~ flank. 6 pieces Artillery,  
various guns etc

~~July fourth another day of inaction & we were never~~  
Some sick sent back. Our Regt having  
received rations later than other Regt commissary  
Commissary had a Committee to wait on him & he  
promised to do better by us, or he would get Reported  
At noon Reported our pickets had been driven in  
Commotion in camps. White badges put our  
orders every body to be ready.

Regt returned without any information concerning  
our pickets and enemy.

Gen. J. E. Johnston & Staff passed down  
line. Loud cheers. Our Regt received  
the Genl in calmness but not silence July 5<sup>th</sup>,  
Quiet Morn But exciting Evening.

July 6<sup>th</sup>

on the night of the 5<sup>th</sup> we were aroused by  
a discharge of pistols & other firearms in front  
on picket lines. the whole line up and ready  
for a fight. Name the Lt. get up on R.  
This was between 1 & 2 on the morning of the 6<sup>th</sup>

July 7<sup>th</sup>

We marched on this day back to Winchester after  
Waiting 4 days for the enemy who would come  
no closer than Martinsburg 6 miles North of  
us. The march to Winchester was rapid for a large  
body of men. No men fainting in going up but  
a good many did coming all I. G. kept up.

Winchester July 7<sup>th</sup> 1861 Sunday  
Reached camp from Dickville at dark  
very much fatigued. Coffee owned made  
Clocks changed to Iron Guard had less  
dick than any other Company from 9<sup>th</sup> Eu.

July 8<sup>th</sup> Sep Parade &c

July 9<sup>th</sup> Mr. Pupper preached. The sermon very  
appropriate and fulfilling. July 10 orders were issued  
~~in marching to the battle ground~~  
beyond Winchester. Yanks approaching.

James Smith died & July 10 buried  
James Smith at 10 o'clock, Cemetery, Winchester.  
14<sup>th</sup> Mr. Pupper preached to Brigade at Request of Col  
Bartow. (Unit you like men) to

15<sup>th</sup> July

orders to be in readiness to march early a.m.  
Cook 3 days rations. Enemy at Bunker Hill  
& miles off. others Brigaded off. ones marching about  
dark. Hauled after passing through many camps  
of troops North of Winchester about one mile.

Sleep on our arms that night. Camp in grove just this  
side of Darkbills Cross Roads Arms at top of hill.

16<sup>th</sup> July

Moved and placed in position to receive the attack  
of the enemy if he advanced against us  
at this evening we were marched back to camp  
no passed. July 17<sup>th</sup> every thing quiet.

Enemy said to be flanking us at Spotsylvania. But  
really they were moving to assist the Rebels  
advancing on Manassas. Prop running daily

July 18<sup>th</sup> 1861

Dressed to march at 170 P.M. very hot afternoon  
after getting out of the City Genl. Bartow told the troops  
that we were destined for Manassas. to aid  
Genl. Beauregard - fighting, fearfull odds.

Irv. Guards Received the news 6  
with loud cheer. March all night until 3  
in the morning of the 19<sup>th</sup>. Crossed Shenandoah  
at midnight. from knee to hips deep. bottom  
cough. road very rough. Troop exhibited some  
confusion with only a few men. This was the  
condition when when got to Paris a little  
Town on the Eastern slope of Blue Ridge.  
~~overland~~ ~~Cavalry~~ ~~Guards~~ kept up with  
few exceptions. Halted 3 hours only.

July 19<sup>th</sup> Got private breakfasts as  
best we could. Had five miles to go to strike  
Piedmont on Manassas Gap Railroad  
Reaching point - 9<sup>th</sup> A.M. 40 miles below Manassas  
Many Troops at Piedmont (10,000) Being sent off  
as rapidly as cars could move them.

Rumors Reports. Luck at Beavergard at Arlington  
Heights. Fed. 50,000 thousand Conf. 2,000  
Former led by Genl. McDowell. Drove back & times  
Lent flag of truce to bury dead.

July 20

Rumors still afloat. Cavalry arriving. So the  
Troop continued to come during night. not much to  
eat. Men brought no rations with them.

21<sup>st</sup>

Troops still leaving. Rur's & Ellis' Regt. to pursue  
Bartons 9 & 11 Regt. ~~etc~~

22

? Regt. off about 8 o'clock A.M. on this morning  
Capt. Norman came by way of ~~over~~ Strasburg  
and met up with us. In a few hours reached  
Manassas. After reaching this point found a serious  
battle had been fought. Waited in cars at junction  
to know where to go. Many reports. Some said  
many prisoners.

July 22<sup>nd</sup> 1861.

Battle of Manassas began about 9 o'clock A.M. Lee's  
late in afternoon. First made in front attack on  
front. Some time before discovered. The first General  
never reached his destination. Genl Beauregard  
sent to know why attack was not made? If ours  
had been properly carried the whole army would  
have been Bagged. The Enemy left the field  
~~... when Bagged and entirely surrounded~~  
Artillery & small arms. Shermans celebrated  
battery of Artillery won the field and captured  
but received, our force not being well sustained.  
Captain & again taken. Captain by us and finally  
held. All the horses killed. Every fought against  
all Military men under confederate flag.  
They were attacked and dispersed.

The first gun was fired at 6 A.M.  
Genl. Scott as Staff of Lee came as far as  
Centreville 6 miles off. The general forced back  
in confusion to the cities of Alexandria &  
Washington Col. Barlow fell. Col. Hartwell of 7<sup>th</sup>  
wounded. also Maj. Glazoway.

Thus closed a signal victory for our arms.  
July 23 we marched from Manassas  
for Smith in rain & mud to Bull Run  
swamp near Lewis' house. Wet & hungry.

July 23<sup>rd</sup>

Most of Genl. Grant visited the field to day.  
Genl. Lee now placed in command of Brigades  
7 8 9 11 Ga. Regt. did not march for several days.

July 27<sup>th</sup>

Moved this day through Battle field.

Halted at Lucey's Mill, and encamped.

July 28 Tuesday

Mr. Pupper preached at Fullerd Mill  
to the Fair in evening over to  
cast 2 Buff nations. Countermanded  
August 1<sup>st</sup> good may look.  
Musles etc. Aug 8<sup>th</sup> orders to march  
to Camp Barlow 3 miles from Manassas  
to get with Brigade.

~~Started at 20 minutes to 11 am. The day was~~  
very hot and disagreeable. Men suffered  
awfully from the rapid march and heat.  
Distance marched was 13 miles - knapsacks  
on. Drilling - Dispersed & for several days.  
Wolfe discharged. along now a great deal of  
rain. 31<sup>st</sup> company visited Bull Run  
Battle field - Working Roads. Looking for  
new encampment. This place has gotten very  
fitti. 32<sup>nd</sup> August orders to move to new  
Camp on a high hill (Camp Walker) back  
when reached.

Aug. 24 Runnes County skirmish  
& advancing. Officers studying the Act of Bill  
relating to Maj. & Col. August begin to appear  
etc. Face. 31<sup>st</sup> Mustard and payroll off for first  
time. To June 25<sup>th</sup> leaving nearly 8 months not paid.  
Preaching & Playmeeting.

September 1<sup>st</sup>

Received 6 recruits Lane, Bowdrie, Williamson  
Karris & 3 Cofc's. A guard on 2nd for com fed  
received from 8 Ga. Regt invitation to go to battle  
field and be present at putting up a marble  
pillar where Col. Barlow fell. Received on Sept-  
4<sup>th</sup> Wolfe on Sept 7 came from Warrenton Spring  
1. Ave discharge.

9<sup>th</sup> page.

10 Sept. 1861.

ordered to cook & prepare to move along about this time a great many sent to Richmond Started from camp Walker or Bartow at 7<sup>th</sup> Left 11 reached place selected about 2 P.M. 4 from Fairfax C. house. 5 from Station. 8 from Antebellum. Some sent to Richmond down to old field Hospital . . . Sept 12

At 9 P.M. at night ordered to march to Fairfax Station. Taking guns. With our company scattered by sickness &c. marched with 34 men & 2 Sarge. 2 Corp. Very cloudy, dark and roads very wet & muddy. Some fell. Some lost shoes. Had to lock arm to keep from falling. After a tramp of a few miles we reached Fairfax Station and found we were not needed. It was said we should have gone to Fairfax C. house.

At 12<sup>th</sup> P.M. dismissed to take care of ourselves as best we could. reached camp at 10 day of the 13<sup>th</sup> over the road traveled night before and wonder how we got along at all.

13<sup>th</sup>

ordered to hold in readiness on our way to parading on 15<sup>th</sup> at 10 o'clock A.M. were ordered to leave at 10 in a half hour off. 3/4 mile more camp forward very hot. reached place at 1 P.M.

16. W. S. Boyce left camp and afterward discharged early in morning an occasional gun towards the fort 9<sup>th</sup> Regt thrown into excitement. Line of march formed afterwards found to be beyond Potomac River

2<sup>nd</sup> at

Regt ordered to fall back to river on 7 A.M.

3<sup>rd</sup>

Reached Meade's Mill about 1 o'clock

15<sup>th</sup>

Munson's Hill. Had 3 Com. Officers 3  
Lagt. 3 Coopers. 31 men. In sight of Wash-  
ington City & Alexandria  
Our first picket duty. Relieved the Ga regt.  
1<sup>st</sup> Regt.

Sept 23. From Munson's Hill the company  
could see by the aid of a good glass  
The capital of Washington soldiers hoing  
Alexandria & fort Ellsworth. Madisons Hill  
and other fortifications & encampments  
on North side of river.

While on picket here the enemy fired a  
Barr some good distance off by some  
explosive material of a Ball. and  
then fired very fast to prevent  
it from being put out.

Here our lines fell back but soon  
advanced, Infantry, Artillery and sea-  
alry. And all anticipated an engage-  
ment.

24<sup>th</sup> Relived by 11<sup>th</sup> Ala. Regt. left the  
Hill and fell back to Falls church &  
Guards.

Sept 25<sup>th</sup> Part of the Regt marched off  
after Breakfast on fatigue duty  
About 1 P.M. we marched off toward  
Lewisville preceded by 17. Va. & R.C.  
Col. Husham's & Regt. understood the  
Yanks had crossed the river for some  
purpose. Stopped a while until Col  
Girard (affirmes) Genl. Stuart would  
Locate the enemy. Every finding out  
our forces in neighborhood began to

Some shots exchanged between the Washington Artillery and enemy.

Result of battle 122 killed, 1 prison taken by confederates.

36<sup>th</sup> Moved to Fall's Church & 1 P.M.  
Started Back to Camps being relieved

Thus ends our first trip to the field along the Potomac. Some fire came back at us.

28<sup>th</sup> Spent in Camps once more waiting to cook up their day's ration and wash. Capt. Morrison went to see Jake Booker. He found him very sick with Pneumonia.

Oscar Booker & W. H. Boyle Discharged in Richmond.

Henry Limmons died on 26<sup>th</sup> at Fredericksburg. Pickets drivers in at Monson's Mill on night of 27<sup>th</sup>.

Sept 28<sup>th</sup> 11<sup>th</sup> Recruits came from home. Oct 1<sup>st</sup> Just full moon received orders to report at 3<sup>rd</sup> 1/2 P.M. to Capt. Kingfellow at Headquarters with 100 Carbs. 20 men for pickets on the Braden Gap road. Did not have for gds.

Oct 5<sup>th</sup> ordered Regt. to report immediately to Genl Longstreet Station 12<sup>th</sup> P.M.

to A. Belvoir 11<sup>th</sup> Va. Col. gallance in mind. Advanced our post on account of horse food). Found ourselves at an old Gentleman's house by the name of Saling. 2 miles from falls church. 9 miles from Alexandria.

Oct 6<sup>th</sup> All guid new wagons come for  
Way. 7<sup>th</sup> Heavy firing in enemies line  
8<sup>th</sup> Heavy rain cool and wet on  
Picket at Mr. Durling's relieved by  
Capt. Web. 9<sup>th</sup> Gas our Rgt.  
10<sup>th</sup> Oct Major Munier in command  
Relieved by 7<sup>th</sup> Ga.  
11<sup>th</sup> Back to our camps by 3<sup>rd</sup> P.M.  
Boys who had been sent off getting  
back to Camp.  
11 7.9.4. Ge. 1<sup>st</sup> fly Rgt on Brigade  
drill afternoon. Genl. Law's Genl. offic  
14<sup>th</sup> Remarkably mild fall first frost  
15<sup>th</sup> At 4<sup>th</sup> A.M. Drockets Berry sent up  
from Court House - Long Roll.  
enters Rgt Callie into line.  
Boys Genl. pretty lively, on that  
night orders to strike tents load wagons  
and ready to march at 3 A.M. 16<sup>th</sup>  
Boys still very lively over the whole Rgt.  
By waiting in line we did not move  
till about 4<sup>th</sup> A.M. Reached Centreville  
on the road leading out to Warrenton  
by 10 or before. This was a general move  
by the whole Army and a succession of  
our lines on the Potomac almost  
totally. Genls Smith Beauregard, and  
Johnston all here.

Centerville

Oct- 17<sup>th</sup>

S. Guards detailed for fatigue duty  
Went over mouth of Centerville and put up  
small & major work

Oct 17<sup>a</sup> On this day began the building of the fortifications of Centreville which held at bay Gen. McClellan on the Potomac and finally left that base and established himself on the peninsula. after one days work we returned to Camps at 5 1/2 o'clock P.M.  
We saw other Regt's out on Inspection & Review we supposed and the general  
drilled about one hour in the night & this had one mile to go to get to camp. all after a hard days work.

Oct. 18 order to reduce baggage of officers to small or value, permits to what they can carry. Trunks &c packed to be sent to Manassas. tents to put things in and a guard for them.

Orders to hold ourselves in readiness to move at once in any direction & with lightness. We were encamped on the road that led from Centreville to Little Stone bridge between 1/4 & 1/2 a mile from town near a house on left hand going from town. Camps all around.

19<sup>a</sup> Oct - George Corbin died 9<sup>th</sup> Oct.

Along now we had drilling dress parades Count marshalls &c etc. Boys from Dick-  
son Co coming in daily. 20 Regt went on picket  
27<sup>a</sup> January a lovely day.

28<sup>a</sup> Oct - Green Smith died in Richmond Oct 22  
29<sup>a</sup> Regt returned from picket afternoon while out there had a barbecue.

28 Oct - For many days Genl John C. Frémont  
had been on Court Martial

31<sup>st</sup> Court martial adjourned. Mustered Regt.  
Nov 1<sup>st</sup> Court Martial in session.

" 2<sup>d</sup> A severe storm began to blow  
Last night continued all day  
A great many tents blown down &  
Nov 3 Preaching - and at other time  
when we can. Court Martial  
~~adjourned~~ adjourned to Sept 1<sup>st</sup> 1862 C.M. adjourned  
Hear did not get off cased. And review  
Genl. Jones Brigade By Genl Johnston  
6<sup>th</sup> on Fatigue duty at fortifications  
west of our camp.

Weather getting quite cold & windy  
on high hill.

8<sup>th</sup> Company Detailed to act as provost  
Guard for Centerville

9<sup>th</sup> Lt. Wingfield office of P. Guard  
Relived for 24 hours by Capt. King's  
company. 10<sup>th</sup> we Irvin Guards relieved  
Capt. King at 4 P.M. Lt. Arnold office  
of Guard. 11 Not certain how long we are  
to remain. 12. Lt. P. T. Griffin office  
of Guard

16<sup>th</sup> Relieve entirely of Provost duty  
at Centerville.

18<sup>th</sup> Regt. moved across the river a  
portion of Mrs. Coca from an Blue Ridge  
seen plainly

In Nov. Fatigue Party on Breastworks  
promised a little front &c &c.

Breastworks to be occupied in event  
of an attack R. S. Dr. Schmid discharged

Stro. 35. now began to cover ground  
melted in clear places. Mountains  
Genl. Review of all the forces of this  
Division by Genl. Johnston. Smith.  
Bearing out. Troops drawn up in position  
so that all would know his post when  
attacked. Genl. Johnston gives  
any orders. Starting of the enemy  
comes before our works he is "whip-

now more.

29<sup>th</sup> Mr. Bigt went on picket

tions accepted, preparatory to being  
attacked for Artillery

11<sup>th</sup> Company had a committee to  
confer with Capt. N. Regarding a  
satisfactory settlement.

10<sup>th</sup> Capt. N. left for Memphis  
Col. Goulding went on out  
for an election on 13<sup>th</sup> to fill up  
up. on same day orders from  
genl. Johnston transferring no regt  
to artillery, and ordering an applica-  
tion for a capt and additional  
officers. one Lt.

W Transferring to Artillery

Dec 13. Genl Johnson's orders not only relieved  
from any further duty with the 2d Regt  
but put us under control of Col.

W. N. Pendleton Chief of Artillery and  
joined us on to Corps Artillery.

Cessions made for Capt John Hause  
1<sup>st</sup> Lieut Ferguson.

Dec 14<sup>th</sup> The Capt went over ~~beyond~~ Curb --  
Pm to hunt a place for an encampment  
And to place the company in Winter  
quarters. Weather fine.

Dec 17<sup>th</sup> Moved to our New camp which  
in honor of one forms Capt. we called  
Camp Norman. And intended by us  
as no slight token of high esteem.

18<sup>th</sup> Weather getting very cold began to put  
chimneys to fuel. So soon as this was  
done began to cut poles & clear off  
grounds for our houses. Now applying  
ourselves assiduously to such hours working  
on Sunday Dec. 28 for we feel it our duty  
to rain nearly all night steady & snowing  
But still we labored.

24<sup>th</sup> getting Boards &c Working on houses

25. Christmas but nothing to have Christmas on  
Dec. 25 houses covered! Capt & Lt. gave a  
christmas treat, an eggnog.

31 Dec. Muster & Inspection by Col. Pendleton

Jan. 1<sup>st</sup> 1862

Jan 3<sup>rd</sup> Nearly finishing houses. Began to work  
on stables. Began to heat just at night.

Lent major to Manassas.

11<sup>th</sup> page  
Moved into Cabins.

Jan. 4<sup>th</sup> February 1862. Camp ~~Bornesay~~  
our deserted tents claimed. Now next care is  
to take care of our horses, apply our efforts  
arduously to erecting Stables. Some little  
work on cabins

Sunday No preaching Col. Pendleton  
being absent. Monday tried to work on  
Stables ground too much frozen & after while  
the ice. Jan 7<sup>th</sup> got some boards for hospital  
putting up Hospital & Capt's house & Lt houses.  
Wood cutting going on for the winter  
keep comfortable. Along now weather  
appearing very much like it would have

snowed Jan 9<sup>th</sup> sent to Manassas for  
Boxes & plants. no plants.

10<sup>th</sup> still working on Capt's house. Hospital etc  
11<sup>th</sup> finished Capt H. & Hospital a nice  
buildings.

13 Jan. Still at work. 14<sup>th</sup> snow from 2-3 inches  
deep. Jan 17<sup>th</sup> still at work on stables

21<sup>st</sup> hauling wood nothing else going on.

22<sup>nd</sup> fenced in stables etc.

23<sup>rd</sup> Cut and split cross pieces for side walls  
along our houses.

34<sup>th</sup> snow on ground. Wagons sent off.

Jan 29<sup>th</sup> made a fence of Hospital and same  
several side walls

Feb 2 Col. Pendleton preaches and orders  
all w- attend to hear what he has to say &  
his company marched over

Thursday 6<sup>th</sup>. Began to establish wood getting  
By Regt's each cut its own wood then haul  
it hauled. Capt Lane having been  
absent since 34<sup>th</sup> of Dec.

Lat 11<sup>th</sup> 1862. Lt Jno. F. Wingfield and Capt  
Lindley detailed to recruit the company  
(While in our tents we as a company  
almost to a man subscribed to the  
Charleston Suffrage). Our effect in recruit-  
ing so far was to leave our permanent  
as an able Company.

After getting our horses all built - we  
wanted straw to lie on so we went  
over to old George a seaman and offered  
him a high price for his wheat  
stack. He refused - we charged and Genl-  
Johnston issue a Special or against the  
perpetrators to pay a high price for said  
straw to lie on we did so.

We continue in camp till about  
March 9<sup>th</sup> 1862 when all things being pre-  
pared for a general fall back we start  
first putting our wagons on the road and  
afterwards putting one before us line of  
march for Richmond

March 20-25

our company reached the Camps at Long  
C.H. House. Some time from the 25<sup>th</sup> to the 28<sup>th</sup>  
Monday 34<sup>th</sup> Went over to Gordonsville to get  
grains but Genl Alexander told us they  
could not be furnished until the  
decision of War Department was known  
from. A difficulty about leaving

On March about the 9<sup>th</sup> we set off - and  
too up our line of March for some point  
of lower latitude, reached Orange Co. No.  
about 20° of Lane Mts.

at this place Capt. Wingfield came to us  
with recruits. In March Davis Artillery  
went with Pendleton's Corps of Artillery  
~~carrying all the horses~~ ~~and~~ <sup>Genl. Peleg</sup>  
claiming and as Company A. carried over  
claiming for ourselves we had by Genl.  
Johnston's Order been transferred to Artillery  
so immediately both sides Col. of Ga and  
Davis Artillery appealed to War Department  
from an adjustment of the difficulty.

Finally by the death of Col Goodee  
the Unit abated and we were by Military  
Law a part of Pendleton's Corps of Artillery.
