To carry into effect the last clause of Paragraph 1, Section 1, Article 7 of the Constitution of 1877:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Georgia, That any person now a bona fide resident of this State, who enlisted in the military service of the Confederate States, or of this State, who, while engaged in said military service, lost a limb or limbs, may furnish to the Governor of this State proof that such applicant has supplied himself with such artificial artificial limb or limbs, and the Governor, on receipt of such proof, is hereby authorized to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of this State in favor of such applicant for either amount hereinafter mentioned, to wit: For a leg extending above the knee, one hundred dollars; for a leg not extending above the knee, seventy-five dollars; for an arm extending above the elbow, sixty dollars; for an arm not extending above the elbow, forty dollars. Provided the said amount of money may be allowed to any one entitled to the benefits of this Act who may prefer to supply himself with the said artificial limb.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted by the said authority, That such application shall contain proof of such applicants being entitled to the benefits of this act, and shall further state whether arm or leg has been supplied. If an arm, whether extending above the elbow or not, if a leg, whether extending above the knee or not, and the Governor shall decide the sufficiency of the proof submitted.

NOTES.

1. If an applicant has been wounded, the description of the wound should be carefully and fully set forth by applicant and physician, and followed by a plain statement of fact showing the extent of the disability. If applicant claims disability from disease contracted in the service, a full and carefully stated history of the disease should be given, tracing the disability by positive proofs to the service.
2. The law makes no allowance for an arm or leg, unless the arm or leg has been rendered substantially and essentially useless.
3. It will not answer to say that an arm is "substantially useless for ordinary pursuits of life, etc." There is no qualification to the clause of the Act in reference to the arm or leg, but the limb must for all purposes be "substantially and essentially useless."



That he has known him for nearly 50 years. I lived in Campbell County, not very far from him, before and during the war, which is now Douglass County, and have lived near him all the time since. I know Mr. Humphries well, and only lived two or three miles from him since the war. I know his condition and I know positively that he is unable to do any manual labor. He stands in great need of help. He has no property and no means of supporting himself. I know that he served in Virginia, in the 51st Ga. Regiment, for over two years until the battle of Gettysburg. He was then transferred to Morgan's Cavalry, which was called Morgan's Sharpshooters. They acted as sharpshooters and scouts for Gen. Morgan.

His Captain's name was Hiland Holmes. He once lived in Atlanta, but information now is that he is dead. ^{Humphries} ~~Humphries~~ received a very bad wound at Chancellorsville, Va., and also received another very severe wound at Sauleburg Va. The wound that he received at Chancellorsville has given him a great deal of pain and suffering; all of the time it continues to discharge, from the time he received it, up to the present. I know to my own knowledge that he has not been able for military services since he received this last wound. When Sherman's Army came through this section of country they captured Mr. Humphries and carried him to prison at Louisville, Ky. I was myself in Ky. in prison in the early part of 1865. His health was very bad at that time, and he was carried to the Hospital and my information is that he remained there until after the close of the war. He came home from Ky. several months after the war.

There was from 25 to 30 men in this cavalry, the Captain of our company was named Eiland Holman, and lived in Atlanta at that time. He was Col. Lee's Adjutant in Atlanta, who commanded the post in Atlanta for some time.

My captain was wounded at the same time I was, I mean the second wound I received. This occurred at Stauleville, Va. After he and I came home on furlough, Morgan's Cavalry, or that part of it in which we belonged went into Tennessee. When Sherman's Army came in here, I was at home on furlough, and could not walk without artificial means; I carried a heavy cane to aid me along. I dropped out from the Sherman's Army as best as I could, but I was reported as having belonged to Morgan's Cavalry, and they to my home, then Campbell County, and took me a prisoner. I was still suffering a great deal from the wounds I had received. They carried me to Louisville, Ky. and my health was so bad, they did not carry me any further, but put me in the Military Prison at that place. I was unable to travel, and they allowed me the privilege of going out in to town, but I did not have any money or anything, and did not know any of the people who lived there. I was compelled to rely on the prison to give me something to eat. My left leg was continually giving me seriously trouble, ulcerated in such a way as to have a discharge, and it has continued from that time until now, and is so now I can hardly get about. My health was so bad and my wounds continued to keep me exhausted in such a way that I was finally sent to the Government Hospital for treatment. I stayed there until after several months after the war was closed, being unable to get home, and

finally about three or four months after the war I was sufficiently recovered to return home.

Deponent further states that from the time he came home, up to the time he left Louisville, that he could hardly live, on account of his condition, and being unable to go into service. If he had been able, he could have escaped, because the Federals knew he could never do anything as far as military was concerned. Deponent has searched diligently for the people who were in the Sharp Shooters in Morgan's Command, who served with him, but he has been unable to find any of them. He is informed that his Capt. is dead. If there was any regiment name to Morgan's Sharp Shooters I do not know what it was, we acted more like scouts for him, but they called us Morgan's Sharp Shooters.
