NOTES.

The pension is only payable to certain classes of widows.

Those whose husbands were killed in service.

Those whose husbands died in the army of wounds or disease contracted in the service.

Those whose husbands went to the army and have never been heard from since the war.

Those whose husbands were wounded in the army and have since died from the direct effects of the wounds.

Those whose husbands contracted disease in the service, and who after the war, died of the disease caused by the service. The disease directly causing the death.

No widow is entitled unless she was the wife of the soldier during the war, and has never remarried.

The law does not provide for any one living out of the State of Georgia, or who did not live in the State at the date of the Act.

The facts to establish a claim must be substantiated by the testimony of three witnesses who personally know of the enlistment of the husband and his death and the immediate cause of the death.

Widows who have married since the service of their husbands in the army are not entitled.

There is no need of employing a lawyer or other agent to attend to these claims. The Department will furnish full and specific instructions, and give ample opportunity to every claimant.

If witnesses live in another County from that wherein applicant resides, they must go before the Ordinary of their County and testify. The attestation of a Justice of the Peace or Notary will not answer, in any case.

If proofs must be made out of the State, the witnesses must be sworn before a Judge of a Court of Record under Seal, and the witnesses must be certified to as reliable, and that their signatures are genuine.



In Every Case after the last clause of Paragraph 1, Section 1, Article 7 of the Constitution of 1877:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Georgia, That any person now a bona fide resident of this State, who enlisted in the military service of the Confederate States, or of this State, who, while engaged in said military service, lost a limb or limbs, may furnish to the Governor of this State proof that such applicant has supplied himself with such artificial limb or limbs, and the Governor, on inspection of such proof, is hereby authorized to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of this State in favor of such applicant for either amount heretofore mentioned, to wit: For a leg extending above the knee, one hundred dollars; for a leg not extending above the knee, seventy-five dollars; for an arm extending above the elbow, forty dollars; for an arm not extending above the elbow, forty dollars. Provided the said amount of money may be allotted to any one entitled to the benefits of this Act who may prefer to supply himself with the said artificial limb.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted by the said authority, That each application shall contain proof of such applicant being entitled to the benefits of this act, and shall further state whether arm or leg has been supplied. If an arm, whether extending above the elbow or not; if a leg, whether extending above the knee or not, and the Governor shall decide the sufficiency of the proof submitted.

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted by the said authority, That no applicant shall receive the sum allowed under this act longer than once in five years.

Sec. 4. Be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act be and the same are hereby repealed.







In the application of John C. Joiner of Douglasville, you stated in your note to the Ordinary that he must show by proof of his own affidavit of his whereabouts during a part of 1863-4. I am sending you his affidavit that he was in the Signal Service of the Confederate Army in Virginia and was captured in December 1863 and was paroled in December 1864. I trust this will be sufficient evidence to entitle Mr. Joiner to a pension, as every body knows he served like all brave confederate soldiers. I notice on the marginal note written by him, that he says Mr. Moreworthey belonged to the same Signal Corps with him. He has written and send Mr. Moreworthey of Virginia, an affidavit swearing to the same facts as he does. Joiner was paroled in Dec. 1864 and the other man was left in prison. He is now a very old man and when Mr. Joiner last heard from him was very feeble, which was two or three years ago.

I also enclose you a letter from Mrs. G. H. Patterson of Lithia Springs. The Ordinary, J. H. McLaury at Douglasville has informed her that she must show the marriage certificate of herself and husband. I do not know whether Mrs. Patterson will be able to get this certificate in time or not. I am writing you to ask you to write Mrs. Patterson to get an affidavit from her son with whom she lives and her daughter-in-law with whom she lives at Lithia Springs and where her husband died, and anyt other citizen that may know that she was his lawful wife and to take these affidavits to the Ordinary and this will be sufficient to establish the marriage. They have been living together all their lives.

You told me when I was in your office that you had approved J. C. Joiners application for pension and also you told me that you had approved and put your mark on the application of W. H. Wright of Douglasville. I do not understand why you have reversed your opinion in these applications. I would see you tomorrow morning but am compelled to go to court in Maralson County and hence cannot see you until I return.



If no application has been made, the description of the wound should be carefully and fully set forth by applicants and physicians, and followed by a plain statement of facts showing the cause of the disability. If applicants claim disability from disease contracted in the service, a full and carefully worded history of the disease should be given, tracing the disability by positive proofs to the service.
2. The disability, or otherwise, for an arm or leg, within the arm or leg the bone must be indicated, indicating and naming.
3. It will not answer to say that an arm is "unbearable" without giving her ordinary functions, of life, etc.
There is no qualification to the clause of the Act in reference to the arm or leg, but the limb must be all perfectly "unnecessary" and "unnecessary" useless.
4. If the application is for a wounded leg, it would seem to be a fair construction of the Act, and the words above, written in my own words, the injury is enough to require the removal of one or both legs, than the leg is not "unnecessary" and "unnecessary" useless.
5. If fingers are retained for ornamentation, and amputations are added to any of the fingers, the amputations must be made under such history as above, and the proofs must show that the amputations have been duly proven.
6. Every application must be certified by the Quartermaster of the company of the regiment of the applicant. The certificate of any officer will not be received in any case.

NOTES.

In order to avoid unnecessary delays to applicants, and to enable all parties interested to understand the laws granting allowances to disabled soldiers, as well as the rules adopted by the Governor concerning the premiums provided, the following suggestions are submitted:

1. If an applicant has been wounded, the description of the wound should be carefully and fully set forth by applicant and physician, and followed by a plain statement of facts showing the extent of the disability. If applicant claims disability from disease contracted in the service, a full and carefully worded history of the disease should be given, stating the disability by positive proofs in the service.

2. The law makes no allowance for an arm or a leg, unless the arm or leg has been rendered substantially and essentially useless.

3. It will not answer to say that an arm is "substantially useless for ordinary purposes of life, etc." There is no qualification to the clause of the law in reference to the arm or leg, but the limb must for all purposes be "substantially and essentially useless."

4. If the application is for a wounded leg, it would seem to be a fair construction of the Act, and the words above quoted, to say that unless the injury is such as to require the constant use of crutch or stick, that the leg is not "substantially and essentially useless."

5. If papers are required for examination, and examinations are added to any of the affidavits, the examinations must be made under oath before an officer, and the proofs must show that the examinations have been duly sworn to.

6. Every applicant must be certified by the Ordinary of the county of the residence of the applicant. The certificates of any other will not be received in any case.

The Commissioners of the several counties are specially requested to call the attention of the physicians and applicants to these points.
