

Those whose husbands died in the army of wounds or disease contracted in the service.

Those whose husbands went to the army and have never been heard from since the war.

Those whose husbands were wounded in the army and have since died from the direct effects of the wounds.

Those whose husbands contracted disease in the service, and who after the war, died of the disease caused by the service. The disease directly causing the death.

No widow is entitled unless she was the wife of the soldier during the war, and has never remarried.

The law does not provide for any one living out of the State of Georgia, or who did not live in the State at the date of the Act.

The facts to establish a claim must be substantiated by the testimony of three witnesses who personally know of the enlistment of the husband and his death and the immediate cause of the death.

Widows who have married since the service of their husbands in the army are not entitled.

There is no need of employing a lawyer or other agent to attend to these claims. The Department will furnish full and specific instructions, and give ample opportunity to every claimant.

If witnesses live in another County from that wherein applicant resides, they must go before the Ordinary and testify. The attestation of a Justice of the Peace or Notary will not answer.



and on oath says that it is untrue that defendant deserted the
Confederate army. Defendant was sent to the improvised
hospital, by the physician, or army sergeant of his regiment,
atlet, Georgia, on account of being unable to serve. This improvised
hospital was some where near Marietta, Georgia, the defendant
cannot now say, and the army kept falling back, and he was
captured by the Federal troops, although he was a mere skeleton
an unable to do any service, was sent back North with the intention
of imprisoning him. His health was extremely bad and he was
permitted to go out into the Country away from the prison, de-
ponent supposed the authorities expected him to die, but he did
not.

Defendant was never able to serve any more in the army, and
was unable to get home, on account of his feeble condition, that
he had no money, and no friends on whom he could rely. He
was among strangers, and it would have been fruitless for him
to have tried to come home. He remained several months after
the war, and sent for means for him come home. It is positively
untrue that he deserted his regiment or Company. He served his
country faithfully, as long as he was able physically to do so.
The facts stated in his original application are true, as
sworn to by himself and the witness thereto attached, and he
hereby refers to said application and affidavit of the witness.

Personally known before me, J. W. Miller, Sheriff, who after being duly sworn says that he is on a visit to his daughter in Birmingham, Ala., having come to this place a few days ago. Deponent says that he is the same person who resides in Douglas County, Ga., and is known in a position as an ex-Confederate soldier of that County. Deponent further says in answer to a certain charge made against him before the Hon. J. A. Lindsey, Peacetime Commissioner of Georgia about taking the oath of allegiance to the United States Government. Deponent says that he volunteered in the army, when he was a young boy. He fought for the cause of the South from the time he entered the service until he was wounded, and while on convalescence from the effects of two wounds that he had received he was captured by the Federal troops, where he was trying to break out of the way, and was carried to Louisville, Ky. His wounds became quite more inflamed and with a number of other wounded Confederate soldiers, he was informed by the Federal authorities of that place, that all the wounded soldiers who were disabled for service as soldiers, and who had looked like they were permanently injured, would be paroled and would have to take an oath that they would not take up arms against the United States, until they were notified about their exchange. There were quite a number of them, and they were marched in, most of them on crutches like deponent, and were told to sign a certain blank that was handed out at a window as they marched through, and each of them signed it. Deponent says that he thought that he was signing an affidavit to get take up arms against the United States unless he was exchanged and was notified. Deponent says that they were

required at that time to go to Indiana across the river; that none of the exchanged soldiers were allowed to return south at that time. Deponent remained in that section on his crutches, unable to do anything anywhere. His wounds were severe and he went on crutches until the war was ended and has never been able to, from that time to render service as a soldier. Deponent has always been true to the Southern cause. He stood by it and fought for it to the end, and had he ever been able to rejoin the Army again, he would have done so, and no person is more loyal to the cause of the Confederate Army than Deponent. He cannot be made to believe that he signed an oath to never take up arms against the United States, and it was his full intention all the time to do so, when he got able to, and was exchanged. There may be other cases, and doubtless were, if such was the affidavit he signed which he does not believe, in which ex-Confederate soldiers were ex-wounded men like Deponent, and if they did, it was a fraud and deception on the part of those who were taking the oath. No explanation was made to Deponent, or the others in his presence at the time, except that they were signing an oath to be paroled on account of their wounded condition. They were marched in by a set of ruffians who treated them worse than if they had been nigger slaves, and no explanation was made except to present them with a paper, sign it, and get away, and he states that all who signed it at the same time, were informed that they were being paroled.

And now comes J. H. McIlwraith of Douglas County, Georgia and appeals to the ruling of the Pension Commissioner in striking his name from the roll of pensioners of Douglas County and prays for a review of said ruling of the Commissioner by the Hon. Joseph E. Brown, Governor of said State as provided by law, especially in section 1481 of Volume 2 of the Code of the State of Georgia of 1910.

APPELLANT sets forth the following facts in relation to the same as they appear before the Pension Commissioner:

That Appellant volunteered in Company K of the 41st Georgia Regiment Infantry in 1862, when he was a boy of about sixteen years of age and he fought in said Company until he was wounded severely and permanently and as stated in his application for pension: that he was sent home on a furlough and captured by the enemy and carried to Louisville, Ky., while he was hardly able ~~to go~~ without crutches on account of his wounds. He was held there in prison for some time hardly able to sit up on account of the severity of his wounds. Appellant and a number of others were held in a place in Louisville, Ky., that was hardly fit for a stable and one day a Yankee officer and a squad of men came to the little old hut in which they were kept and said to the men, who were all disabled and wounded, and could not get about, that they would be paroled on account of their wounded condition. They were carried to some officer's place and told to sign a paper that would parole them. They each signed it and were sent across the river without a cent and among strangers and Appellant with running sores from the wounds inflicted. He was unable to get away from the place until long after the

war. He did not know that it was claimed that he was making an affidavit of allegiance to the Government of the United States. Had he known that such was the case, he would have died before he signed it, if he did ~~not~~ sign it. The paper was not read to him nor any of the other men, and they were treated as if they were not human beings and told to sign the paper without asking any questions. The facts attending his signing the paper at Louisville, Ky., at the time specified is set out in an affidavit and statement made by Appellant which is in the hands of the Hon. John H. Lindsey, Commissioner of Pensions, on file with his application for pension.

APPELLANT says that there was some kind of a charge made once before against him since he has been drawing a pension and the charges dismissed, and he was placed on the pension roll by the Hon. John H. Lindsey, Pension Commissioner.

WHEREFORE, APPELLANT presents this, his appeal from the ruling of the Pension Commissioner aforesaid and prays that the Governor will investigate the ruling of the said Pension Commissioner and reinstate Appellant.

He prays that the Commissioner will certify and send to the Governor all the papers connected with his pension, the application and proof of the same and his answer or affidavit to the alleged oath taken by Appellant at Louisville, Ky., and that said Pension Commissioner will transmit all of the papers of said appeal case to the Governor of the State under his hand and seal, and that such proceedings be had therein as will be according to law.

APPELLANT says that the Commissioner erred in striking his name from the list of pensioners in Douglas County.

1st:- Because he had once had the questions investigated on charges made against him, which charges had been dismissed and Appellant sustained and permitted to remain on the roll of pensioners as above stated, and this having been done, that no further charges could be made against him by any person or persons as to his eligibility as a pensioner.

2nd:- That it is known to the Pension Commissioner that Mr. J. T. Pilgrim who made the second charge against Appellant, is unworthy of belief, having been convicted in the United States Circuit Court of Atlanta, Ga., for the offense of counterfeiting the coin of the United States and is a man now of bad character outside of this and is not worthy to be believed and any attack that he has made has been shown before the Commissioner to come from an unworthy source, by men of high standing in the churches of the country and officers of the state.

3rd:- That Appellant should not be struck from the roll, under the articles before the Commissioner but that Appellant should remain on the pension list as he has done heretofore.

Appellant further prays that he may be allowed, if the Government should see that other evidence is necessary, to produce evidence before the Governor, as to his loyalty as a soldier and citizen of the Confederacy.

That department and said McElreath were in the same Company, Company "E" of the 41st, Georgia Regiment in the war, and was carried away to prison, and when he got up to the prison, he was so feeble, he was unable to be taken care of, and was sent out to a home some distance from the prison, and remained there. He did not take the oath of allegiance to the United States Government. He returned home some months after the war, but still in a very feeble condition, and of my knowledge of his condition and of his wounds, he was never able to serve any more during the war. I know positively that he did not desert and leave the army. I make this affidavit, because of justice to Mr. McElreath, as I understand some person has stated that he deserted.. I positively know that he was examined by a physician, and was directed to go to the improvised hospital, and it was stated to him, that as soon as he got able that a furlough would be given him, so that he could go home. I know that he could not do any service, and was never able to make a soldier and perform the duties after the time aforesaid. He made a good and brave soldier as long as he was able, but after receiving the wounds, and being otherwise afflicted he could not serve any longer.

Those whose husbands were killed in the service.

Those whose husbands died in the army of wounds or disease contracted in the service.

Those whose husbands went to the army and have never been heard from since the war.

Those whose husbands were wounded in the army and have since died from the direct effects of the wounds.

Those whose husbands contracted disease in the service, and who after the war died of the disease caused by the service. The disease directly causing the death.

No widow is entitled unless she was the wife of the soldier during the service and has never remarried.

The law does not provide for any one living out of the State of Georgia.

Widows who have married since the service of their husbands in the army are not entitled.

Widows whose husbands enlisted from another State or served in other Commands than Georgia Commands
are not entitled to pensions unless they were born in Georgia and can make proof of that fact.

No pension can be paid for previous years.

The facts to establish claim must be substantiated by a testimony of three witnesses who personally know
of the enlistment of the husband and his death and the immediate cause of this death.

If the husband died since the war testimony by physicians must be produced.

Witnesses must go before the Ordinary of their County and testify. The attestation of a Justice of the
Peace or Notary will not answer in any case.

If proofs must be made out of the State, the witnesses must be sworn before a Judge of a Court of Record
under seal, and the witnesses must be certified to as reliable, and that their signatures are genuine.

Amending proofs must be executed with the same formality as original proofs and the Ordinary should so
certify.





Those whose husbands were killed in service.

Those whose husbands died in the army of wounds or disease contracted in the service.

Those whose husbands went to the army and have never been heard from since the war.

Those whose husbands were wounded in the army and have since died from the direct effects
of the wounds.

Those whose husbands contracted disease in the service, and who after the war, died of the disease
caused by the service. The disease directly causing the death.

No widow is entitled unless she was the wife of the soldier during the war, and has never
remarried.

The law does not provide for any one living out of the State of Georgia, or who did not live in the
State at the date of the Act.

The facts to establish a claim must be substantiated by the testimony of three witnesses
who personally know of the enlistment of the husband and his death and the immediate cause
