I knew Mr. William Russell Tinsley for twelve years before his death which occurred on June 30th of this year, I was with the Tinsley family at the time of his death and acted as one of the pallbearers at his funeral.

I had often heard Mr. Tinsley speak of applying for a state pension before he died, and while he was at work as a Section Foreman on the Atlanta and West Point Railroad where I was employed as Telegraph Operator and Interlocking Towerman. Mr. Tinsley, however, realized that his income as Section Foreman prevented his getting a Pension as long as he could work. After he was paralyzed in December of last year and could no longer draw his salary from the railroad he secured Pension application blanks, and about two weeks before he dropped dead he asked me to fill out the blank attached hereto which was written at his dictation in filling in the questions and answers. This information was on hand with the family in my hand write at the time of his death, and this is how they knew of his exact war record, as no living witness to his service could be found. Mr. Tinsley expected to have my pencil copy from his dictation recopied on a typewriter before submitting it to the Pension Commissioner.

During my caseer with the Tinsley family I often conversed with Mr. Tinsley about his war experience. He wore a suit of the Confederate Gray when attending the reunions of the old soldiers, and his widow who makes this application now has his uniform with the badge furnished by the Daughters of the Confederacy as a keep sake to his memory.

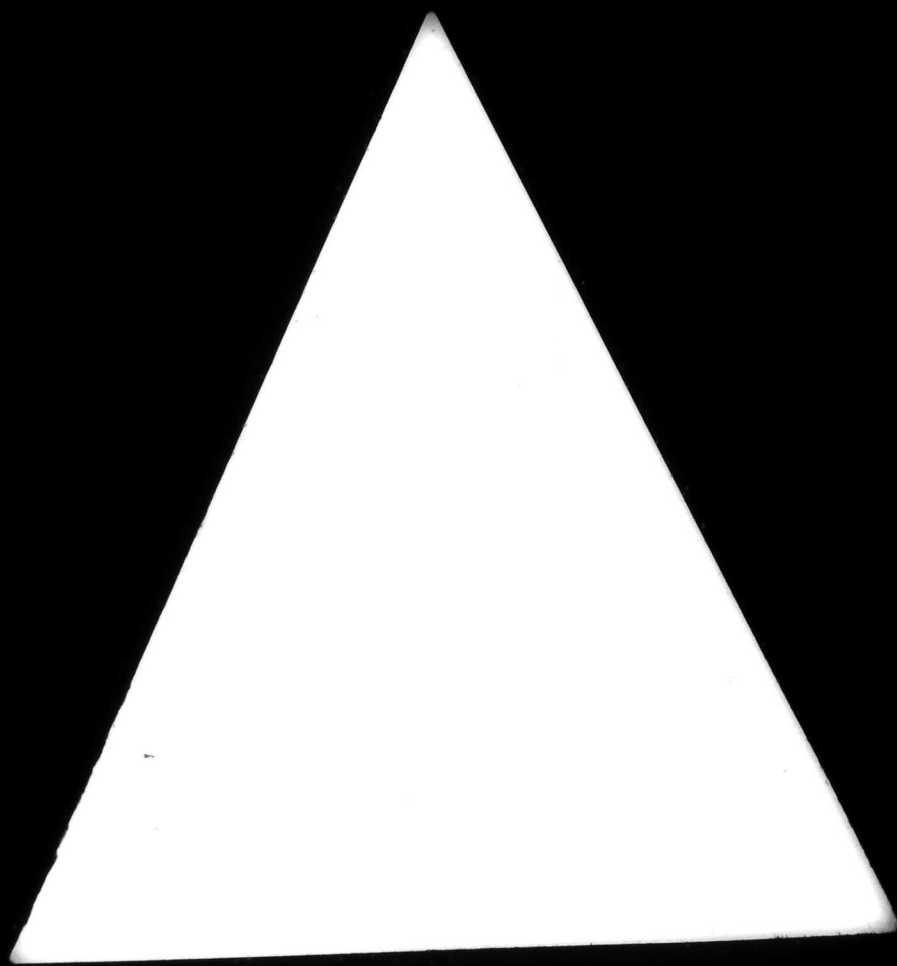

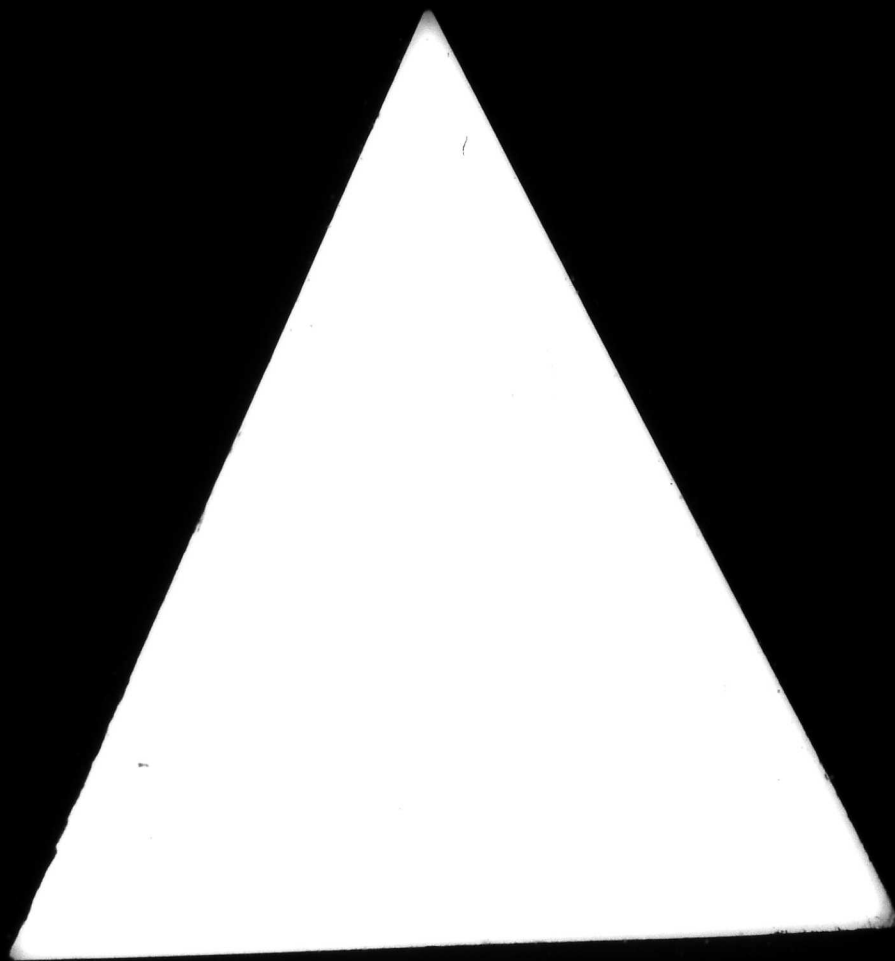

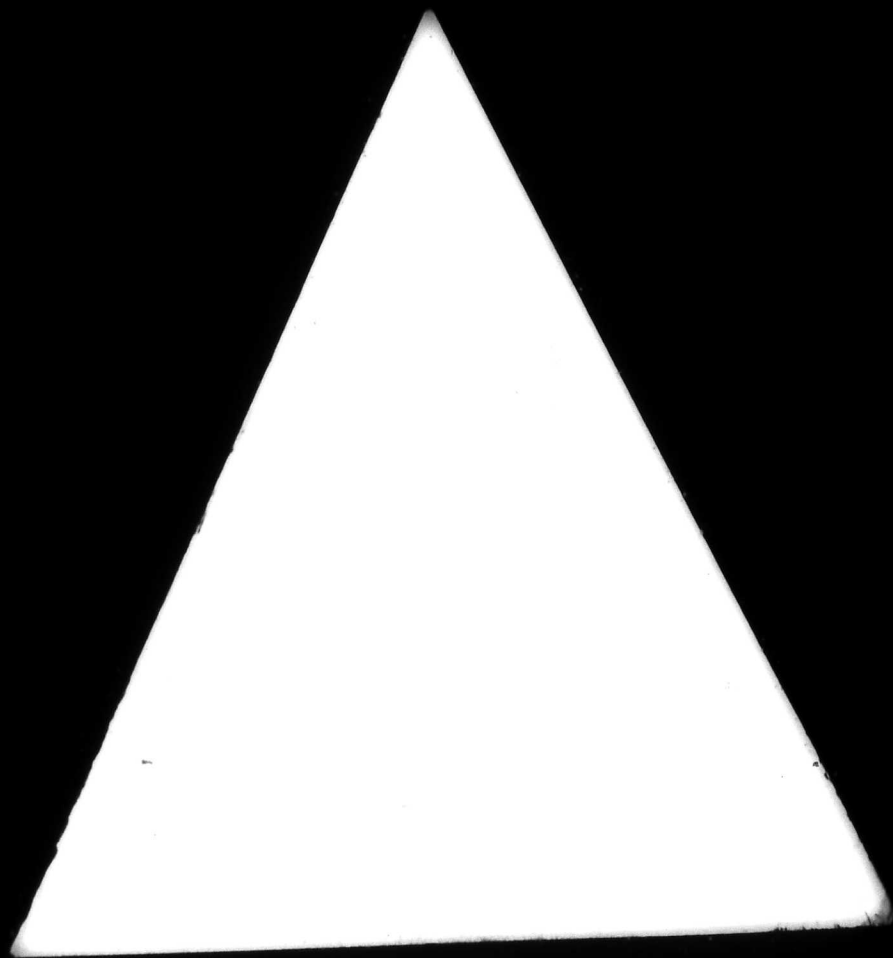

## AN ACT

To carry into effect the last clause of Paragraph 1, Section 1, Article 7 of the Constitution of 1877:

SEC. I. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Georgia, That any person now a bona fide resident of this State, who enlisted in the military service of the Confederate States, or of this State, who, while engaged in said military service, lost a limb or limbs, may furnish to the Governor of this State proof that such applicant has supplied himself with such needful artificial limb or limbs, and the Governor, on reception of such proof, is hereby authorized to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of this State in favor of such applicant for either amount hereinafter mentioned, to-wit: For a leg extending above the knee, one hundred dollars; for a leg not extending above the knee, seventy-five dollars; for an arm extending above the elbow, sixty dollars; for an arm not extending above the elbow, forty dollars: Provided the said amounts of money may be allowed to any one entitled to the benefits of this Act who may prefer to supply himself with the said artificial limb.

SEC. II. Be it further enacted by the said authority, That such application shall contain proof of such applicants being entitled to the benefits of this act, and shall further state whether arm or leg has been supplied. If an arm, whether extending above the elbow or not; if a leg, whether extending above the knee or not, and the Governor shall decide the sufficiency of the proof submitted.

SEC. III. Be it further enacted by the said authority, That no applicant shall receive the sum allowed under this act oftener than once in five years.

SEC. IV. Be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act be and the same are hereby repealed.

1. If an applicant has been wounded, the description of the wound should be carefully and fully set forth by applicant and physician, and followed by a plain statement of facts showing the extent of the disability. If applicant claims disability from disease contracted in the service, a full and carefully stated history of the disease should be given, tracing the disability by positive proofs to the service.
2. The law makes no allowance for an arm or leg, unless the arm or leg has been rendered substantially and essentially useless.
3. It will not answer to say that an arm is "substantially useless for ordinary pursuits of life, etc." There is no qualification to the clause of the Act in reference to the arm or leg, but the limb must for all purposes be "substantially and essentially useless."
