That said soldier enlisted in the service of the Confederate States for the Georgia State Troops, on or about the day of April 1863. That while in said service, or by reason of said service in the Army, he lost his life as follows: By Confederate troops

Cold, settling in his lungs and causing
Inflammation of the Lungs and
a severe Cough, and also heart
disease, from which com-
plaints he died after being
permitted to return home on
a furlough because of the
illness which was known to
the proper authorities to have been
contracted while in discharge of his
duties as a soldier.

Certificate of Ordinary of the County of Applicant's Residence.

I, *W. B. Locum* Ordinary*Fulton*in and for said County of *Fulton*

State of Georgia, hereby certify that I am acquainted with Mrs. *E. L. Wyatt* the applicant for pension in this case, and know, from my own knowledge, or from positive proof furnished to me by reputable witnesses, that she resides in this County, and that she resided in the State of Georgia on December 23d, 1890, and has not lived out of the State since that date. I also certify that the witnesses whose testimony she presents to sustain her claim are known to me to be reputable men, and I am fully satisfied that this claim is made in good faith, and that the witnesses to read or hear read the proofs they sign.

NOTES.

- The pension is only payable to certain classes of widows.
- Those whose husbands were killed in service.
- Those whose husbands died *from* any of wounds or diseases.
- Those whose husbands went to the army and have never been near.
- Those whose husbands were wounded in the army and have since died from the wounds.
- Those whose husbands *contracted* disease in the service, and who after the war, died of the disease caused by the service. The disease *directly* caused the death.
- No widow is entitled unless she was the wife of the soldier during the war, and has never remarried.

The law does not provide for any one living out of the State of Georgia, or who did not live in the State at the date of the Act.

The facts to establish a claim must be substantiated by the testimony of three witnesses who personally know of the enlistment of the husband and his death and the immediate cause of the death.

Widows who have married since the service of their husbands in the army are not entitled. There is no need of employing a lawyer or other agent to attend to these claims. The Department will furnish full and specific instructions, and give ample opportunity to every claimant. If witnesses live in another County from that wherein applicant resides, they must go before the Ordinary of their County and testify. The attestation of a Justice of the Peace or Notary will not answer.

If proofs must be made out of the State, the witnesses must be sworn before a Judge of a Court of Record under seal, and the witnesses must be certified to as reliable, and that their signatures are genuine. Fill out Power of Attorney authorizing some one who can call at Treasurer's office in Atlanta and receive the money, to receipt for same.

In person came before me, the undersigned Ordinary in and for the County of *Fulton*

E. L. Wyatt, who being sworn according to law, says under oath that she is the widow of *E. W. Wyatt*, who was a soldier in the service of the Confederate States, and served as a member of Company *" "* of the *16th Battalion* Regiment of *Gen. Law* Volunteers; that he enlisted in said service on or about the *1* day of *April* 1863, and was in the *Confederate* Army up to *December* 1864. That while in the Army, he was on the *1* day of *186* (See Note No. 1)

that he came home in *Morgan County* Georgia, and was suffering from *Inflammation of the Lungs*, *very bad Cough*, and great anxiety *for* about *the* *heart* caused from *Cold*, contracted while in the service of the *Confederate Army*, from which he died. *June 14th 1865*. He went away to the army a *very stout* healthy man and returned a *very sick* man. He came home on a *far* long because of his sickness. I read his *far* long. He told me he contracted the *sickness* in the army. I have talked with *old* soldiers & they always told me the *sickness* was contracted in the service.

Deponent further swears that she was the wife of said deceased soldier during his term of service in the Army, and that she has never married since his death; that she became his wife on the *22* day of *April* 1851, and that she has resided in Georgia continuously since the *6* day of *Jan* 1833; that Georgia is her home, and was such on the 23d day of December, 1890, and since said date she has not lived in any other State or locality. Deponent, as the widow of said deceased soldier, applies for the pension provided by Act of the General Assembly of Georgia, approved December 23d, 1890, for the pension year ending February 15th, 1892, and herewith tenders the proof of her right to receive the allowance granted by said Act.
