Died from disease prior toupto his date of enlistment and after the surrender he continued to complain and suffer with said trouble up to his death. He lived and died for the war and exposure therein. From what they know of him were the and from their knowledge of his condition after the war said soldier had not improved. Said soldier died on the 28th of April, 1865. Said soldier often said he was ill of the lungs and was emaciated and very debilitated before his death. He was a man of middle size and had a strong constitution. Said soldier when examined that relapse of disease was the cause of his sickness and would die of his disease. 40 days, on marching the defendant Robertson said he frequently met said soldier
after he got home at the close of the war till his death. He was always
complaining of his lungs hurting him up till his death. According
green & Aaron both said they had close neighbors to said soldier William Aaron
then and since the war up till his death. That he never die decays from
the effects of measles, that he was always complaining of his lungs hurting him
up till his death. That we would often see him bear hemorrhages of his
lungs, after he got home up till his death. we are satisfied said lung trouble
was the cause of his death.

Our opportunity for knowing the facts stated in reference to death of applicant's husband were

by knowing him from boyhood up till death and solduring with him
in the same Co. & Reg. or other State here our knowledge. We all knew him
from boyhood, he was looked upon as one of our sturdiest young men of
