Affidavit to be Made by the Widow.

In person came before me, the undersigned Ordinary

in and for the County of *Wilkes*

Mrs. *Amanda M. Brock*, who being sworn according to law, says under oath that she is the widow of *George H. Brock*, who was a soldier in the service of the Confederate States, and served as a member of Company

Regiment of *Alabama* Volunteers; that he enlisted in said

service on or about the *sixth* day of *July* 1862, and was in the

Army up to the *first* day of *April* 1863. That while in the

Army, he was on the *first* day of *April* 1863, (See Note No. 1)

Said soldier was under General *Hager* Cavalry, *Frogs* and *White* in Kentucky, was captured (she thinks in Kentucky) and was carried to Camp Chase and died there as she was informed by her neighbors. She does not remember the name of the company who were in prison at the same time. Said soldier was a member of a *Alabama* Regiment. She does not remember the letter of said soldier's company or the number of his Regiment.

Deponent further swears that she was the wife of said deceased soldier during his term of service in the Army, and that she has never married since his death; that she became his wife on the *25th* day of *June* 1851, and that she has resided in Georgia continuously since the *25th* day of *December* 1865; that Georgia is her home, and was such on the 23d day of December, 1890, and since said date she has not lived in any other State or locality. Deponent, as the widow of said deceased soldier husband, applies for the pension provided by Act of the General Assembly of Georgia, approved December 23d, 1890, for the pension year ending February 15th, 1892, and herewith tenders the proof of her right to receive the allowance granted by said Act.

Mrs. J. M. Brock of the County of Gilmer
State of Georgia, is the widow of J. M. Brock who was a soldier in
Company of the Alabama Regiment of Volunteers.

That said soldier enlisted in the service of the Confederate States (or the Georgia State Troops) on or
about the 20th day of July 1861. That while in said service, or by
reason of said service in the Army, he lost his life as follows: I further swear that said soldier
J. M. Brock swears that said soldier
enlisted as stated above and went into
the army and never returned. David
Garrison swears that he saw said soldier
at Cumberland Gap in the Spring of 1863
and that said soldier was a member of the
Alabama Regiment of Cavalry Troops.
said soldier was in the Confederate service
in E. Miller swears that David M. Brock
was the wife of said soldier at the time of
service and that said soldier was never
returned since the war and that Mrs
J. M. Brock is still the widow of said soldier.
Witness all state that they have
fully understood and are satisfied
that George M. Brock died at Camp
Chase in Prison.

We further swear that Mrs. J. M. Brock was the wife of said
soldier during the service, and that she has not intermarried since his death, and that she resides in
Gilmer County of the State of Georgia.

good faith, and that I have caused the applicant and the witnesses to read or hear read the proofs they sign.

NOTES.

- The pension is only payable to certain classes of widows.
- Those whose husbands were killed in service.
- Those whose husbands died in the army of wounds or disease contracted in the service.
- Those whose husbands went to the army and have never been heard from since the war.
- Those whose husbands were wounded in the army and have since died from the direct effects of the wounds.
- Those whose husbands contracted disease in the service, and who after the war, died of the disease caused by the service. The disease directly causing the death.
- No widow is entitled unless she was the wife of the soldier during the war, and has never remarried.
- The law does not provide for any one living out of the State of Georgia, or who did not live in the State at the date of the Act.
- The facts to establish a claim must be substantiated by the testimony of three witnesses who personally know of the enlistment of the husband and his death and the immediate cause of the death.
- Widows who have married since the service of their husbands in the army are not entitled.
- There is no need of employing a lawyer or other agent to attend to these claims. The Department will furnish full and specific instructions, and give ample opportunity to every claimant.
- If witnesses live in another County from that wherein applicant resides, they must go before the Ordinary and testify. The attestation of a Justice of the Peace or Notary will not answer.
- Fill out Power of Attorney authorizing some one who can call at Treasurer's office in Atlanta and receive the money, to receipt for same.
- Fill out the "directions" below Power of Attorney, so that your Agent will know where and how to send the money.
