# Affidavit to be Made by the Widow.

*5<sup>th</sup>* Regiment of *Georgia* Volunteers; that he enlisted in said service on or about the *11<sup>th</sup>* day of *May*, 1861, and was in the *Confederate* Army up to *4<sup>th</sup>* July, 1864. That while in the Army, he was on the *front* rank in *June*, 1864. (See Note No. 1)

*affected with chronic Dysentery* while serving in the Army around *Altamaha* was sent to Hospital near *Atlanta* where he remained some *two* weeks, when *deponent* went for him and removed him to their home, where he died of said disease on the *4<sup>th</sup>* day of *July*, 1864. *Deponent* declares under oath that her husband never had this disease prior to this attack & that nothing else contributed to his death.

Deponent further swears that she was the wife of said deceased soldier during his term of service in the Army, and that she has never married since his death; that she became his wife on the *8<sup>th</sup>* day of *May*, 1861, and that she has resided in Georgia contiguously since the *8<sup>th</sup>* day of *May*, 1837; that Georgia is her home, and was such on the 23d day of December, 1890, and since said date she has not lived in any other State or locality. Deponent, as the widow of said deceased soldier husband, applies for the pension provided by Act of the General Assembly of Georgia, approved December 23d, 1890, for the pension year ending February 15th, 1891, and herewith tenders the proof of her right to receive the allowance granted by said Act.

## NOTES.

- The pension is only payable to certain classes of widows.
- Those whose husbands were killed in service.
- Those whose husbands died in the army of wounds or disease contracted in the service.
- Those whose husbands went to the army and have never been heard from since the war.
- Those whose husbands were wounded in the army and have since died from the direct effects of the wounds.
- Those whose husbands contracted a disease in the service, and who after the war, died of the disease caused by the service. The disease directly causing the death.
- No widow is entitled unless she was the wife of the soldier during the war, and has never remarried.

The law does not provide for any one living out of the State of Georgia, or who did not live in the State at the date of the Act.

The facts to establish a claim must be substantiated by the testimony of three witnesses who personally know of the enlistment of the husband and his death and the immediate cause of the death.

Widows who have married since the service of their husbands in the army are not entitled. There is no need of employing a lawyer or other agent to attend to these claims. The Department will furnish full and specific instructions, and give ample opportunity to every claimant.

If witnesses live in another County from that wherein applicant resides, they must go before the Ordinary of their County and testify. The attestation of a Justice of the Peace or Notary will not answer.

If proofs must be made out of the State, the witnesses must be sworn before a Judge of a Court of Record under seal, and the witnesses must be certified to as reliable, and that their signatures are genuine.

Fill out Power of Attorney authorizing some one who can call at Treasurer's office in Atlanta and receive the money, to receipt for same.


