while engaged in the *31st* at *Macon* he attacked with *Brain* stroke, from which he died on the following day. Deponent makes this statement from information given her by his comrades and neighbors who were present at the time. Deponent does swear that her husband entered the militia service at the time stated and has never returned since been heard from since the war.

Deponent further swears that she was the wife of said deceased soldier during his term of service in the Army, and that she has never married since his death; that she became his wife on the *19th* day of *September* 1844, and that she has resided in Georgia continuously since the *19th* day of *September* 1844; that Georgia is her home, and was such on the 23d day of December, 1890, and since said date she has not lived in any other State or locality. Deponent, as the widow of said deceased soldier husband, applies for the pension provided by Act of the General Assembly of Georgia, approved December 23d, 1890, for the pension year ending February 15th, 1892, and herewith tenders the proof of her right to receive the allowance granted by said Act.

dead, yet Defendants do swear positively that Mr. Tiller
belonged to their command that he was in the engage-
ment at Mission on the day named, that he was collected
as a dead man - (which was an intensely hot day), that
he had been seen in the corner of the
pen, when the command was forced to leave that spot
when it was known that he died the following day of the
stroke, Defendants do swear that Jasper M. Tiller has never
been heard of since that time, and have no hesitation in
saying that to the best of their knowledge and belief Jasper
M. Tiller died at the time & place stated, and from the
cause stated.

NOTES.

- The pension is only payable to certain classes of widows.
- Those whose husbands were killed in service.
- Those whose husbands died in the army of wounds or disease contracted in the service.
- Those whose husbands went to the army and have never been heard from since the war.
- Those whose husbands were wounded in the army and have since died from the direct effects of the wounds.
- Those whose husbands contracted disease in the service, and who after the war, died of the disease caused by the service. The disease directly causing the death.
- No widow is entitled unless she was the wife of the soldier during the war, and has never remarried.
- The law does not provide for any one living out of the State of Georgia, or who did not live in the State at the date of the Act.
- The facts to establish a claim must be substantiated by the testimony of three witnesses who personally know of the enlistment of the husband and his death and the immediate cause of the death.
- Widows who have married since the service of their husbands in the army are not entitled.
- There is no need of employing a lawyer or other agent to attend to these claims. The Department will furnish full and specific instructions, and give ample opportunity to every claimant.
- If witnesses live in another County from that wherein applicant resides, they must go before the Ordinary and testify. The attestation of a Justice of the Peace or Notary will not answer.
- Fill out Power of Attorney authorizing some one who can call at Treasurer's office in Atlanta and receive the money, to receipt for same.
- Fill out the "directions" below Power of Attorney, so that your Agent will know where and how to send the money.
