Allgood of said State and County, hereby applies for the pension provided by Act of 1910, as amended by Act of 1919, to Confederate Soldiers, and submits his sworn statement, with his testimony to make out the same, and after being duly sworn true answers to make to the questions propounded, answers as follows, to-wit:

1. What is your name and where do you reside? (Give County and Post-office) E. W. G. Allgood Randolph County, Oklahoma Route #1
2. How long and since when have you been a continuous resident citizen of this State? 79 years
3. Did you enlist in the Army of the Confederate States or in the organized militia of this State from 1861 to 1865? yes Army of Confederate States
4. When and where, and in what Company and Regiment did you enlist? (Give the arm and class of Service) March 1862, Staunton Ga. Co. 1st Ga. Cav.
5. How long did you remain in the actual military service with said Company and Regiment? (Give date of discharge) until the Surrender 1865
6. When and where was your Company and Regiment surrendered or discharged from the Service? Clamentsville or Charlottsville N.C.
7. Were you actually present with your command when it was surrendered or discharged? yes, was present at the surrender and was in the hands of the enemy.
8. If you were not actually present, state specifically and clearly where you were N.C. with principal part of my company by Capt. Bennett
 - a. Where was your command when you left it? Clamentsville N.C.
 - b. When did you leave the command? after the surrender
 - c. For what cause did you leave? By order of Capt. Bennett to go on
 - d. By whose authority did you leave? James G. McCall Capt. Bennett
 - e. For how long was your leave granted? In what way? for 30 days
 - f. Why did you not return to your command after leave expired? leave did not expire
 - g. In what way were you prevented? Not until surrendered
 - h. What effort did you make to return? none
 - i. Were you captured during the war? no

6. How long within your own personal knowledge did he perform actual military service with this Company and Regiment? (Give date) 3 yrs until surrender in May 1865
7. When and where was his command surrendered or discharged (give date and place) May 1865 near Greensboro N.C.
8. Were you personally present at the surrender? Yes
9. If not, where were you and how came you there? Was there

10. Was the applicant personally present with his command at surrender? Yes But not present when Regt was paroled
11. If not where was he and how came him there? Was detained by Col. Devall to take care of his property
12. When did he leave his command? at surrender Where was his command when he left it? near Greensboro N.C. For what cause did he leave? Detained
- By whose authority did he leave Col. Devall and how long was he granted leave? Indefinitely How do you know all that you have stated to be true? If of your own knowledge, tell clearly and specifically. I was present
