I am especially grateful for the several photostatic copies of documents in your files and hope you may some day be fortunate enough to come across, without special search, letter of 1838 which my grandfather wrote to Governor Gilmer (GAG)

The photostatic copy of my grandfather's receipt for pay in connection with his service in the General Assembly, as well as that of the land grant to him are valuable additions to my memorabilia. His younger brother, Ezekiel Slaughter Candler, also served in the legislature and was comptroller general for three www.georgiapioneers.comms as is revealed by your service cards.

> For your further information about this family, I enclose a copy of my records, from which you will note that Ezekiel Slaughter Candler married Jane Williams of Tennessee on August 19, 1839 in Coweta County and died in Atlanta on the 12th of January 1869. This information is recorded by Governor Allen D. Candler in his "Colonel William Candler His Ancestry and Progeny", published 1902. Governor Allen Candler, a nephew of Ezekiel Slaughter Candler, was five years old when his uncle married. Surely when he wrote his book he must have known the maiden name of his aunt.

I am very glad to have the photograph of you standing alongside the manatee, which was killed by a shrimp boat crew in the water adjacent to the north end of Cumberland Island. It was a most unusual circumstance that this interesting mammal was found in those waters. Yours is the only picture I have of it and obviously I have never had any intention to show such pictures on TV. That supposition is pure fiction. One of my grandsons was visiting with a party of friends at the Island when the shrimp boat crew brought the carcass alongside our dock.
