He commanded army of King Malcolm IV, and quelled the insurrection of "The Moray Men", 1161-1163. He was founder and first chief of Clan MacIntosh.
7	-1209	Shaw-MacIntosh, married Mary de Sandylands, daughter of Sir Henry de Sandylands; begot	Second Chief of Clan MacIntosh. He was governor of Castle Inverness for 30 years.
8	-	William Mackintosh (2nd son), wed Beatrice Searmouth; begot	First son (3rd Chief), Ferguhard; had no children.
9	-1265	Shaw-MacIntosh, married Helena Campbell, daughter of William Campbell of Calder; begot	Fourth Chief of Clan Mackintosh.
10	-	Ferguhard Mackintosh, wed Mora MacDonald, daughter of Angus MacDonald of Sals; begot	Fifth Chief, who was killed in a duel.
11	1268-1345	Angus MacIntosh, married Eve "Mor", daughter of Gilliecatan "Mor"; begot	Sixth Chief. Gilliecatan was founder of "Clan Cattan", Angus became leader of this clan. He fought in the famous Bannockburn Battle of 1314.
12	-	William Mackintosh, second wife was Margaret Mackie; begot	Seventh Chief. Married twice, first wife was: Florence Campbell of Calder, who begot Lachlan Mackintosh, Eighth Chief, who married Agnes Fraser of Lovatt, who begot Ferguhard Mackintosh, ninth Chief. Ferguhard, "unwilling to engage in warfare", resigned as chief.

John McIntosh, married Margary Fraser; begot	1st Chief. Was captain in English army, and lived at "Macintosh Bluff." His daughter, Catharine, married a British officer, and was mother of Governor Troup of Georgia.
William McIntosh, married a Greek Indian princess; begot	22nd Chief. Came to Georgia in 1735. Traded with the Greek Indians on west side of Chattahoochee River, and there married a Greek Indian princess.
William McIntosh, married Eliza Hawkins; begot	23rd Chief. Born at Coweta Town, at which place Gen. James Oglethorpe, founder of Georgia, signed a good will Treaty with Creek Indians Aug. 21, 1739.
	Through McIntosh's influence a Treaty between the Creeks and United States was signed at Indian Springs, Bulloch County, Feb. 12, 1825, when the Creeks extinguished all rights to Georgia land; for other lands beyond Mississippi River and sum of \$400,000.
	McIntosh's wife, Eliza Hawkins, may have been related to Col. Benjamin Hawkins, after whom Fort Hawkins in Bibb County was named. Hawkins placed McIntosh in command of friendly Creeks to preserve peace. Gen. Andrew Jackson praised McIntosh for his wonderful support in War of 1812. He was known as General McIntosh.
	Hostile Creeks who rebelled at the Treaty, murdered McIntosh and scalped him May 1, 1825.
