

Will of Alexander, 160000

St. Marys Camden County, State of Georgia

May 24th 1850

I, Alexander, Curtis of St. Marys, Camden County, State of Georgia, do hereby make this my last will and testament, to give devise and bequeath all my estate and property, real, personal, and of all kinds whatsoever at now present, or may hereafter become possessed of unto my friends William B. Lawrence of 22 Union Square in the City of New York and Joseph J. Corbelle of St. Marys, Camden County, Georgia, Gentlemen. And having full and perfect confidence in their integrity and judgment, I desire and direct that either of them, whichever action or any Court or Justice shall be required to give any bonds for any act of theirs in dealing with my property, estate or effects, and if further desire and direct that if ~~any~~ said Court find it any more to their satisfaction convenient to act one for the other, instead of both when dealing with my property, that such action with be, and may be considered good and legal, so far as my ~~testamentary~~ ^{testamentary} intentions are concerned, and lastly though not anticipating any such contingency, my power is vested in my property, or effects, namely to divide their decision in case any misunderstanding should arise as to my intentions, and further to do so, or in any way legal or otherwise interfering with, or obstructing the action of my executor, the said William B. Lawrence and Joseph J. Corbelle, said party do interfering or disputing, shall forfeit their

interest in this my last will and testament, and my said Executors shall be at liberty to make any disposition which seems to them good of such disputed property or interest.
