

The last will of John Hitchcock
late Master of the Sloop two Tons of Tonnage
deceased, bequeathed by him by word of mouth
On the fourth day of July One thousand
Eight Hundred and Twenty, that he wished
to make his will then said, that he wished
after his changes were past, that the balance
of his Estate be given to M^{rs} Russell for the
care she has and would take of him, & said
he has three ~~children~~ ^{children} namely of Y^elow, as
last, two of them he has contracted to let
Captⁿ Baker have at ten dollars, if he
pays for them, the other he wishes M^{rs} Russell
to have, he further mentions, when the day
of his death was,

Those were the words spoken
by the said deceased, Joseph Hitchcock in
the presence of us, who have hereunto

thirteenth day of July One thousand and
Eight Hundred and Twenty

act and actions, Voluntary, and free from fraud
and that Doctor Lucius Hitchcock and
James Vincent subscribed their Names with
the Deponent to the truth thereof -
