In the Name of God, Amen -
I, John Lafargue of the County of Camden
and State of Georgia, being sick and weak in
body; but of sound mind, memory, and un-
derstandings do make this my last will and
Testament in manner and form following -

First, of all I commend my soul into the
hands of Almighty God who made it, not
doubting in a Resurrection; and my body to
the Earth, from whence it came, to be decently
buried after the Custom of this place -
I give and bequeath all my Estate both
real and personal, to my beloved Friend
J^r L^r Serri of Cumberland Island, a bounty
and State of said, and I do nominate and
appoint him the said J^r L^r Serri my sole
Heir and Executor, hereby revoking all former
Wills. In Testimony whereof I have
hereunto set my hand and Seal at
said Cumberland Island, this 8th day
of September 1810 -
