Will of Thomas Carnegie.
Exemplification and Probate Proceedings
In the Name of God, Amen.

I, Thomas Carnegie of the City of
Pittsburg Alleghany County, Pennsylvania
being of sound and disposing mind and
memory, do make this my Last Will and
Testament: hereby, revoking all other
wills by me heretofore made.

First:

I give to my Mother Margaret Carnegie
an Annuity of Two Thousand "2000" dollars
per year during her life, which Annuity
I charge upon my Estate, said Annuity
shall be paid by my Executor into such
banks as my Mother may designate from
time to time, to the Credit of my Mother

Second:

I give devise and bequeath unto
my beloved Wife Lucy Coleman Carnegie
all of my Estate, Real and Personal and
mixed, wherever Situate, subject to the
charge of said Annuity, to hold to her, her
heirs and assigns.

Third:

I give to my said Wife, exclusive
charge and Guardianship of the persons
and Estate of my Children until their
majority.

Fourth:

I nominate and appoint my said
wife to be the Sole Executrix of this my
last will and Testament regarding her

her however, to advise with my brother Andrew Carnegie and my father-in-law William Coleman in the management of my Estate; and this request I make not to be binding upon her, but as the expression of my opinion as to the better course for her to pursue.

As Witness whereof I have to this my last will and testament written on one sheet of Paper, set my hand and seal at Pittsburgh this 14th day of June A.D. One thousand Eight hundred and seventy one.

Envelope marked "A" handed witness -
Thomas M. Carnegie handed me this package sealed and, in the condition it now is endorsed, "Last will of T. M. C." he just said "this is my will if any thing should happen to me" - at the time I was Cashier of the office of Carnegie Bros. & Co., Limited, and had charge of Mr. Carnegie's personal bills, notes, out checks for the same and taking receipts. It was Thomas Carnegie's business to approve of Vouches for Carnegie Bros. & Co., Limited & Vouches for payment of bills handed witness. These are approved by Thomas M. Carnegie, by marking them "T. M. C." as was his custom. I am acquainted with his hand writing. Having seen him write frequently - and saw it nearly every day for seven years - the endorsement on the envelope is in his (Thomas M. Carnegie) hand writing. I think Mr. Carnegie handed me this package two years ago last October. He went east that day and returned a short time before going South where he usually went about the first of November.

This package has been in my custody and was kept in a steel box in a safe of Carnegie Bros. & Co., Limited from that time until his death.

I have been associated with Thomas M. Carnegie in business &c. for over 20

year - am familiar with his hand writing - it was his duty, to approve of Voucher for the Company - in the Month of Decr he signed "T. M. C." (endorsement on Envelope of "Shorn Witness") this is all in his hand writing. (Exhibit B "Shorn Witness") the following endorsement on "B" Lucy's mother's Mother's income to ten thousand per year. T. M. C. is in the hand writing of Thomas Carnegie, he was accustomed to designate his log as Lucy - I first saw Exhibit "X" and B and received them from Mr Burgess after Thomas Carnegie's death. The envelope I saw opened, "X, B & C" are the same but I received from Mr Burgess I delivered them to W. F. McCorkle, Esq. in presence of Mrs Thomas Carnegie and her sister Mrs Margaret Fuller, Mrs Nancy Bradley and Miss Florence Coleman and also Georgeander.

Henry Phipps, Jr. sworn:

I have been acquainted with Thomas Carnegie since 1848 or 1849 and have had frequent opportunity of getting acquainted with his handwriting. Thomas Carnegie's practice of approving Voucher &c. of the Company was by writing "T. M. C."

Endorsement on Exhibit "X" identified as hand writing of Thomas Carnegie (Exhibit B "Shorn Witness") the endorsement "Lucy's mother's Mother's income

to \$10,000 per year T. M. C. is in Thomas Carnegie's hand writing. I think it was 100 days before his last illness (we were discussing the subject of his Mother's will, when he (Thomas Carnegie) mentioned that he had increased the allowance to his Mother in his will to \$10,000 per year he said that he did this not because she was in need of it but as a mark of filial affection. I first saw these papers on November 6th 1886, in hands of W. F. McCorkle Esq.

John Walker, sworn

Have been associated with Thomas Carnegie for over five years. was well acquainted with his hand writing. Exhibit "X" (Shorn Witness) the endorsement is in Thomas Carnegie's hand writing. Exhibit "B" (Shorn Witness) the endorsement is also in Thomas Carnegie's hand writing. his practice in approving Voucher of Company was by writing "T. M. C."

A few days before the death of Mr Carnegie in walking over to Allentown, Mr Phipps told me that Thomas Carnegie had told him that day or the preceding one that he had increased his Mother's allowance to \$10,000 a year.

At November 23rd 1886, the testimony of the above named witnesses being sufficient I as clerkly advised the foregoing will to probate and ordered it to be recorded as such & thence under my hand the above date.
