I also give her a house and lot which I now live in, this property is hers for life, if at her death should there be any of this property in her possession, I will it should go back to my children, or their increase to be divided to each. I give and bequeath and devise all my property and estate real and personal, to my wife Christiana Proctor, and my five children, names, William Proctor, Daniel Proctor, Theodore Proctor, Vergique Proctor, Isabel Proctor now Mrs Tompkins, their heirs, executors, administrators and assigns and tenants in common, to be divided between them as follows, to wit, I give to Isabel Tompkins my daughter five hundred dollars more than the other heirs, the balance to be equally divided to all the

 heirs. If there should be any of my wife's portion in
 her possession at her death, I will it should go to
 to my children or their issue to be divided to each.
 I leave to J. P. Colvin or his heirs Five dollars in
 to give him his portion. I hereby make and constitute
 Julius Barakat, and Abner De Long, exec-
 utors of this my testament and last will. In witness
