Secondly I constitute and appoint my Wife Martha Staunton and my friend Peter Remser of New York Executors of this my Will hereby revoking & annulling all other and former Wills by me made whereof I have

of February in the year of our Lord One thousand
Eight Hundred & fifteen

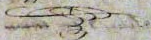
