

State of Georgia. I, the undersigned, with my wife and
 family being low in
 health but of sound disposing mind and wishing to make
 disposition and publish this my last will & testament
 First I command my feeble body to the dust whence it
 came and my soul to the hands of my Creator—
 In making my disposition of my worldly effects as
 I have set in my will & desire first the tract of
 land upon which I now reside being part of the
 lot I gave Joshua Parley Joseph Parley and
 Ephraim Heard and the Thon herd to be divided
 or sold as a majority of them may deem proper
 Second the title of which I hold for the County of Wilkes
 (Amberly 122) one hundred & twenty two and the lot in the
 district I give to the legal representatives of William
 Parley & Co and to the legal representatives of Caleb
 Parley & Co to be equally divided & subsement
 hereafter named
 Third I give to Benjamin H. Parley and his heirs the
 tract or half of lot of land of William William Whit-
 hard now living.
 Fourth I give to my son Orin Parley and his heirs the
 portions my wife & I to Little Anthony, Eddy, Stephen,
 Peter and Celia and their heirs.
 Fifth I give to my son Joseph Parley four hundred
 dollars at Consideration of his services & obligations he
 claims to a certain cargo named Big Anthony &
 which said sum of four hundred Dollars is to
 be paid by my father named Executors as soon as
 they conveniently can — I hold some notes made
 by Thomas Whitaker and Joseph Heard which I wish
 to be disposed of as follows — First I wish all my
 just debts paid immediately paid — To my grandfather
 Joseph H. Parley of the sum of One hundred & thirty dollars
 when he passes at the age of twenty one years which
 is to remain in the hands of the Executors of J. Parley until
 making the same over to the said J. H. Parley
 when due — which is not to be paid until he is of legal
 age & living

Copy of Verdict of Assizing Court 5th 1832 - On the count
 of Unlawful Prosecution against Jacobus B. Morgan, for the
 offense of Unlawfully Prosecuting James H. Morris and after being duly sworn said
 the jury say, that the said Jacobus B. Morgan did
 and he published the Writter as his last will & Testament - and that
 they do the verdict that at the time of such publishing & signing
 of publication that the said Jacobus B. Morgan was in his proper sense
 and of sound mind disposing himself, according to the best of their
 knowledge & belief
 Done in open Court the 5th March 1832.
