Item 1<sup>st</sup> I desire that my body shall be buried in a ~~convenient~~ suitable  
my circumstances and condition in life in the place where I now am  
and by the care of my deceased husband James Glass

Item 2<sup>nd</sup> It is my will that after my death my Executors shall  
sell all my property consisting of two negroes (to wit) Betty and Louisa  
one horse and one buggy household and kitchen furniture and  
all other property of any description that I may own at the time of  
my death and that the proceeds arising from such sale be equally  
divided among my following <sup>named</sup> children to wit: Maria Glass  
Taney Mastry wife of Joseph Mastry, Sarah Bate, Mary Catherine  
Austin wife of John P. Austin, James Glass, Jeremiah Glass, Penelope  
Pace wife of Johnson Pace and Stephen Glass.

Item 3<sup>rd</sup> It is my will and desire that my youngest Stephen G.  
Glass with whom I now live should not be charged by my Executors  
one cent for the use of my land and servants and other property nor  
much as he has protected me in my Marrowbone and its age I hereby  
release him from any and all liability that he may have incurred in  
account of having the use of my property.

Item 4<sup>th</sup> Having full confidence in my son Martin Glass  
I hereby nominate and appoint him Executor of this my last  
will and testament.

set her hand and affixed her seal this the sixth day of  
April 1855
