

John Harvis

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I John Harvis of the County of Jackson State of Georgia, desiring to give right and proper directions to the distribution of my estate after my death, do make public and declare that my last will & Testament is as now lies.

Item 1st I direct that all my just debts be paid as promptly as may be.

Item 2nd I direct that all my property real and personal be sold publicly and without order from the Court of Jackson by my Executors hereinafter appointed, for the payment of my debts if any exist at the time hereinafter named. The time of said sale I refer to the discretion of my Executors to be exercised by him with a faithful care and regard for the best interests of my legatee.

Item 3rd It is my Will that such of my children as may be living with me at my death, shall be permitted to reside with me at my death, where he is permitted to reside in Livingston and the premises therein being, until my Executors make sale thereof, and that such family supplies as may be on hand at the time of my death be for their use and consumption without charge against them for the same, and not to be inventoried. And that such of my furniture as is contained in my dwelling house remain therein for their use until the date of the above dwelling house.

Item 4th Whereas heretofore made an agreement to my son John P Harvis I bequeath to him to be paid out of my estate, the sum of Five hundred dollars only - this bequest not being made in any spirit of discrimination against him.

Item 5th For good and sufficient reasons, well known to all my dear children, hereby included I bequeath one part of my estate to my son Isaac P Harvis. To his wife Susan P Harvis I give Five hundred dollars.

Item 6th To my daughter Susan A Harvis I give Nine hundred dollars, in addition to the Five hundred dollars.

Before we were I believed such an oath to be
 the only way to settle the public mind and to
 preserve the state at home and abroad. I was
 that I should subscribe the same in a written
 form of oath and in the presence of Robert R. Hood and
 John P. Thompson and also subscribe the same
 in the presence of the state of each other.
 That since there was no other party and voluntarily
 by the state on the 12th day of December 1893
