In the second place I give unto my beloved
 wife Rebecca the tract of land I now live
 on during her natural life or widowhood.
 And at her death or marriage said tract of
 land to be sold and the proceeds of the same
 to be equally divided between my two children
 born to me William James and Rebecca
 Jane. And I should say more. The balance
 of my property both real and personal I
 bequeath it to be sold to the highest bidder
 or even as convenient after my decease
 and the proceeds of the same to be equally
 divided between my said wife or before
 mentioned two children. In the third place
 I appoint my brother William Stewart my
 lawful executor to this my last will and testa-
 ment.
