 I, George W. Wheeler, of the County
 of Newton and State of Georgia, being
 of sound and disposing mind and
 memory, and being desirous to settle
 my worldly affairs while I have strength,
 do hereby make and publish this
 my last will and testament hereby
 revoking all wills, by me, at any time
 heretofore made, And first I commit
 my soul to God, who gave it and my
 I desire to be buried in the family
 grave yard, Newton County, And my
 worldly estate I dispose of as follows-

First

After my burial expenses and just debts
 are paid, I give and bequeath to my son
 Doctor Wheeler, a certain black horse
 which he knows as the Fowler horse and
 I give by name to have and hold and to
 use and apply in any (way?) it shall see fit
 may think best.

Second

I give and bequeath every thing, I
 possess to my wife, Priscilla Wheeler,
 during her natural life, to have and to
 hold and to use as she may think best
 and at her death to be sold and her
 just debts to be paid, the remainder
 to be divided amongst my several
 children, share and share alike.
 Now if any of my children should
 fail to make their appearance
 within twelve months after the death
 of my wife, Priscilla Wheeler, that they
 are to have no part nor lot in themat-
 ter whatever.

Third

Now if any of my children should
 die my land at the date of my prop-
 erty, it is my will that child demand
 it, that he or she shall have three annual
 installments in paying for the same
 without interest.

Fourth

I now appoint to this my last will
 and testament my friend W. J. Smith,
 executor in every respect whatsoever.

In witness whereof I the said
 G. W. Wheeler, at this my last will, consist-
 ing of one sheet of paper, have set
 my hand and seal this the twenty
 fourth day of July 1874.
