

## GEORGIA'S NET QUOTA IN NEXT CALL 17,395

Approximately 8,000 Will Be  
Inducted Into Service  
June 19-29

Georgia's net current quota under the new selective service regulations effective June 1 is 17,395 men, according to announcement made Monday by Major Joel B. Mallet, in charge of the selective service in this state.

This quota was arrived at by the following method of calculation:

On May 1 the local boards of Georgia reported a total of 25,659 fighting men in class 1, exclusive of delinquents, men in the emergency fleet service, men held for limited service, men placed in remediable defect groups, men previously inducted, men with cases pending before medical boards and district appeal boards, and men not physically examined.

Taking 80 per cent of the 25,659 fighting men, so as to allow for an unanticipated shrinkage of 20 per cent, and subtracting the number of men who have gone into the service since May 1, leaves a net balance of 17,395, which is Georgia's net current quota.

These are the men who will be called into service to supply Georgia's apportionment of the next levies. When they will be called depends on the needs of the war department. At present, 8,000 of them have been called in the period from June 19 to 29.

The apportionment of Georgia's net current quota (17,395) among the several counties has been made by Major Mallet, and notices went out Monday to the various local boards.

Fulton county's apportionment is 80 men. Atlanta local board No. 1 is 478, No. 2 is 257, No. 3 is 103, No. 4 is 521, No. 5 is 112, No. 6 is 120, No. 7 is 176.

Chatham county's apportionment is 163 men. Savannah local board No. 1 is 55 men, and No. 2 is 158 men.

Bibb county's apportionment is 107 men. Macon local board No. 1 is 5 men, and No. 2 is 6 men. The smallest of the latter apportionments is due to the large number of men already inducted by these two boards.

The plan of the war department is to replenish class 1 by rounding up delinquents and going over the lists again. Then at a later date, probably three months hence, a new net quota will be calculated, after the replenishing process has been completed. From this time on, a new current quota will probably be announced every three months.

To replenish class 1, the following steps will be taken:

First, by setting all pending cases, of which there are 12,000 in Georgia; second, by the new registration on June 5, when Georgia is expected to register 25,000 men, who will immediately be classified; third, by apprehending delinquents; fourth, by re-examining all doubtful classifications; fifth, by re-examining men previously placed in limited service; sixth, by appealing to doctors to correct remediable defects; seventh, by scrutinizing the emergency fleet list.

## AMERICANS ARE GIVEN WELCOME TO FRENCH TOWN

Brother of Major Ullern, Instructor at Camp Gordon, Extends Greetings to Guests of Village on Leave

Recently a number of American soldiers on leave of absence from the trenches for a week repaired to the village of Savoy to take their rest.

Emile Ullern, a prominent citizen of the district, and a brother of Major Ullern, who has been instructing recruits at Camp Gordon for several weeks, was chairman of the committee appointed to extend them a welcome. He delivered an eloquent address to his fellow-citizens, calling on them to open their hearts to the boys from America, and then in a few words addressed himself to the soldiers.

Major Ullern has made many warm friends at Camp Gordon and in Atlanta. He goes now to Spartanburg to continue his instruction of recruits. He has won four medals for valiant conduct on the field of battle.

In addressing the citizens of Savoy, Emile Ullern said it "was surely an honor and a privilege to have with us these sons of an ardent and generous people." He said the people would "not stare at them as if they were a kind of curious and interesting novelty, but we shall see in them the living representatives of that nation which has freely offered us the support of its moral power, its wealth and its fighting men because it is convinced that the cause of the allies is the cause of righteousness, justice and liberty."

Finally, he said, they should "remember one fact to which no French woman can be indifferent. It is that among these boys, these husbands, these soldiers, there are many who have forever said farewell to their homes and firesides and to the land that gave them birth, for their tombs will be somewhere yonder in the soil of our beloved France which they have come to defend and to deliver."

In greeting the American soldiers, M. Ullern said:

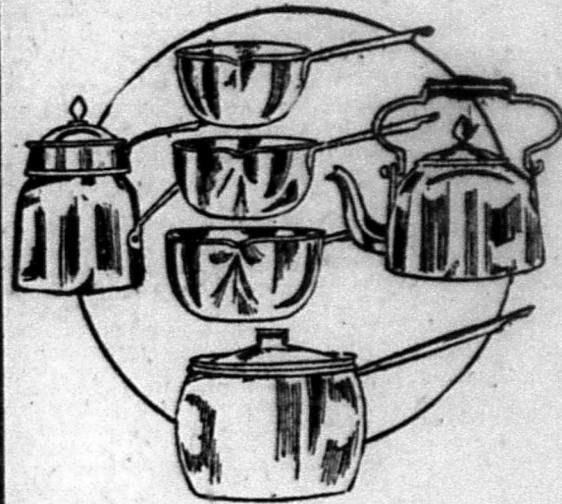
"Citizens of the great American republic, soldiers of liberty: As it has pleased you to come to us for your seven days of leave, which you cannot enjoy at home in your far-distant and beloved country, believe us when we tell you that we receive you as comrades-in-arms, and as if you were our own sons.
