



Fifth Georgia Privates Are Given Sentences at Leavenworth Barracks

CAMP WHEELER, Macon, Ga., June 1.—Sentences of three members of the One Hundred and Twenty-second infantry (Fifth Georgia), to serve terms at the Leavenworth disciplinary barracks were approved today by General Leroy L. Lyon, commander of the Dixie division, and they will be sent to prison immediately.

Private C. G. Barksdale, of Company L, was given the longest sentence. He must serve fifteen years. He was found guilty of being absent without leave and escaping from guards by leaping from a train at Belair, Ga. Three previous convictions were considered.

Private Marion J. Wallis was sentenced to serve two years. He was found guilty of being absent without leave from January last, until March. He surrendered to a military policeman in Atlanta, Ga. Private Claude J. Kelly, of Company I, was acquitted of refusing to submit to an operation. Private Arthur S. Parks, of the One Hundred and Twenty-second, was sentenced to serve five years at Leavenworth. He was found guilty of escaping from guard house.

Private Marlon J. McDaniel, of the One Hundred and Twenty-first infantry (Second Georgia), was sentenced to serve ten years. He was found guilty of being absent without leave.

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
