

Fifth Georgia Privates Are Given Sentences at Leavenworth Barracks

CAMP WHEELER, Macon, Ga., June 1.—Sentences of three members of the One Hundred and Twenty-second infantry (Fifth Georgia), to serve terms at the Leavenworth disciplinary barrack were approved today by General Lero; L. Lyon, commander of the Dixie divi sion, and they will be sent to prison

immediately.
