This station will be in charge of Lieutenant Ellsworth, of the personnel department. All paper work, however, will be done at the receiving station on Hardie avenue.

HARRIS CONTINUES HIS ATTACK ON HARDWICK

Senatorial Candidate Is Given Cordial Hearing by McDuffie Voters

THOMSON, Ga., June 8.—William J. Harris, candidate for the United States senate to succeed Thomas W. Hardwick, was given a cordial hearing by the McDuffie county citizens when he spoke in the courthouse here today. Senator Hardwick again was the center of Mr. Harris' attack and while he mentioned the other candidates, he had little to say about them except to review the correspondence between Congressman William Schley Howard and President Wilson.

"The record of Senator Hardwick," said Mr. Harris, "is not one to be proud of. It is filled with votes for theaiser. Now me one single instance where the junior senator has voted with the declaration of war. You can't do it. Every vote that he has cast since we declared war on Germany has been a vote against the president."

Mr. Harris reviewed his own record at length, going into detail as to his accomplishments as state senator, director of the census and chairman of the federal trade commission.

Following the speaking Mr. Harris expected to go to Augusta for a short conference with friends in Richmond county. He will return to Atlanta Sunday and will remain there until Tuesday, when he starts on a trip down to southwest Georgia.
