## MANY PROMINENT MEN TO GO TO ST. MARYS

Governor's Party to Attend  
Conference Will Leave  
Atlanta Sunday Night

Governor Hugh M. Dorsey yesterday had received acceptances from many prominent southerners to attend the meeting Monday and Tuesday at St. Marys looking toward the construction of the St. Marys-St. Mark canal and the erection of a government coaling station at the south Georgia port.

The Atlanta party will leave tonight at 10:30 o'clock over the Southern railway, going to Folkston. They will be met at Folkston by a boat which will convey them down the St. Marys river to the port.

Among those who will go from Atlanta, are Governor Dorsey, Hollins Randolph, S. G. McLendon, Bradford Byrd, of The Atlanta Journal; J. A. Hollomon, of The Constitution; W. G. Bryan, of The Georgian, and Telemann Cuyler. Other Georgians, who expect to attend the meeting, are Charles S. Barrett, of Union City, president of the National Farmers' union; J. H. Mills, of Jenkinsburg, president of the Farmers' Union of Georgia; Harry Hodgson, of Athens; Morton Turner, of Quitman; J. W. Callahan, of Bainbridge and Fuller E. Callaway, of LaGrange.

Governor Dorsey also had received acceptances from General Julian S. Carr, of Durham, N. C.; Dr. C. J. Owen, of Washington, managing director of the Southern Commercial congress.

If the project is put through Georgia, it is said, will not only have an important coaling station, but will be linked up with the Gulf of Mexico by an inland waterway which also will tap the coal fields of Alabama.

His formal announcement follows: "I hereby announce my candidacy, from the county at large, for membership upon the board of commissioners of roads and revenues of Fulton county, subject to the Democratic primary September 11, 1918.

"I make this announcement in response to requests from a large number of friends who have urged me to become a candidate and have assured me of their support. If elected, I shall conscientiously endeavor to represent the best interests of Fulton county in its entirety, and shall oppose the expenditure of public funds for the special benefit of private interests.

"I have never before sought public office of any kind. I believe, however, I am acquainted with the needs of the county, and shall, if elected, devote a sufficiency of time to the duties involved.

"I shall greatly appreciate the support of my friends and the voters generally."

## ORME WILL CONDUCT CAMPAIGN FOR BONDS

People Will Be Told of Urgent  
Need for Certain Municipal  
Improvements

With but only four more weeks between now and the day that the voters of the city of Atlanta will be given the opportunity to express by ballot their desires either for or against the flotation of an \$800,000 emergency bond issue to finance urgent municipal improvements, Councilman A. J. Orme, chairman of the special committee on bonds of the city council, announced Saturday night that his committee would inaugurate next week a whirlwind campaign to again remind the voters of the necessity of the improvements contemplated.

The special election to determine the bond issue will be conducted on the same day and at the same polls that the municipal primary for the nomination of various city officials and council members will be held. The date is July 10th.

The campaign contemplated will extend to the ten wards of the city. Several months ago, when the election had been set for a date in May or June, the council members composing the special committee of the council held several meetings to advise the voters of the great need of the proposed improvement. Active campaigning was discontinued when the election was postponed to July 10th.

Every one of the proposed improvements contemplated under the bond issue are recognized by council members and leading civic and labor organizations as imperative. These organizations have passed resolutions indorsing the bond issue.

The items of the proposed issue are as follows:

For new equipment at the waterworks, \$500,000.

For financing the complete motorization of fire department, \$125,000.

For building new cyclorama structure, \$100,000.

For building generating plant at city crematory, \$75,000.

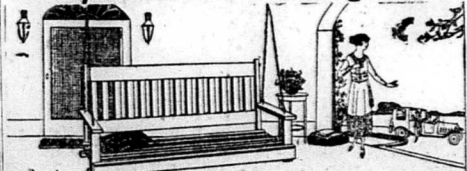
