# Two-thirds of Tin Can: Still Being Thrown Away

Despite an increase in the collection of tin cans, the waste in the collection of tin cans is still being thrown away in this country today, the War Production Board reported.

Since the tin can salvage program was started in effect last spring, collection of tin cans has increased from 1,000 tons during the first month of the campaign to 20,000 tons in April. But says WPB, present tin can salvage is only one-third of a conservatively estimated potential.

From tin cans are salvaged tin and copper. The bulk of tin is salvaged in the form of tin cans and steel production—percentage reckoned as 1 per cent of tin and 99 per cent of steel scrap.

About 90 per cent of America's tin can supply is made of tin. It is off as a result of war, and only a part of it is now being supplied by Bolivia and Belgium.

Congo ore. Most of the tin that used to go into civilian supplies has been diverted to war needs. A large quantity of tin has gone into the manufacture, but manufacturers are now making the tin go faster, further than it went before.

So, WPB urges, have estimated tin cans, flatten them out, and turn them in to be salvaged.
