This application was filed the 6th day of April 1887, and submitted by attorneys to the Commission April 24, 1887. The applicant alleges he derives his Cherokee blood from his Grand Mother Elizabeth Hohimer who Elizabeth Sidebottom whose name he believes may be found on the Census rolls of Cherokee by blood taken and made in the year 1853. The evidence in this case consists of three corporate affidavits taken in Kansas and Missouri, and which go to establish the fact that Mrs. E. Hohimer is the son of John Hohimer, the son of Elizabeth Hohimer whose maiden name was Elizabeth Sidebottom, but it does not show that he was a Cherokee or that he descended from a Cherokee by the name of his alleged ancestor found on the census not being found on the Census rolls of 1880, is adjudged by the Commission and so declared that Wm. Hohimer is not a Cherokee by blood and as such not entitled to citizenship in the Cherokee Nation. This decision does not include his children Nancy M. Hohimer aged 17 years, Launcy J. Hohimer aged 13, and James C. Hohimer aged 9 years. Post Office Fall River Kansas.

Under an act of the National Council passed Dec 8th 1886 authorizing this Commission to sit certain persons herein named to appear and answer complaint of the Cherokee Nation charging said parties with having obtained citizenship by bribe and bribery and also cause why the above named persons have committed said offense before the Commission as provided for. It appears that the said Hannah Flippin did at the last election in 1886 file a claim of citizenship before what is known as the Cherokee Nation in Tahlequah. It also appears that the said Hannah Flippin in filing her declaration before the said Commission alleged that she was the descendant of the John Bryant of Gibson Co. Texas whom she claims was a Cherokee by blood. There were eight witnesses present before said Commission who testified to testify definitely as to the said John Bryant. In the first place there is no birth certificate of the said Hannah Flippin and the affidavit of B. H. Evans as before the Court of Montague Co. Texas. Should he notice in the affidavit of Evans he does not explain how he became possessed of the knowledge that Bryant was a Cherokee Indian by blood but simply states that he knew Bryant and that he knew him to be the same that he did to be part and main reason of the action in behalf of Flippin before the Texas Court had at any time heard of the Cherokee Nation east or west or that they had the slightest acquaintance with Cherokee Indians so far as their testimony goes. The said Commission admits the affidavits of parties which experts and totally untrue to the Commission and especially that of Evans giving such a statement can only be accounted for in the light of subsequent events. The investigation of the case before the Commission is largely the subject matter of the testimony of the Cherokee and the non-Cherokee of the town which was examined. The deposition of people taken in Cherokee town shows much light on the different parts in the investigation. The deposition of Jack Edwards a man over fifty years old states that he has been living in the town of the name of Redwater and further of Edwards has ever lived in the vicinity of his home. When he was born there is no record of his birth in Gibson Co. Texas and a man fifty seven years old and was acquainted with John Bryant in his life time and a man named Edwards that he knew a man named Jack Edwards but does not remember his middle name who once lived in Cherokee but left said town about forty years ago under disreputable circumstances. Edwards at that time bought a man of Negro and went south with them leaving his family and never returning to them nor to pay for the Negro he had bought from the statement of said Robinson said Edwards was residing some where in the state of Texas about the time his affidavit was presented before the Commission. Under this state of circumstances this Commission cannot attack the least importance to the affidavit of the said J. H. Edwards qualified to before the Court of Montague Co. Texas. The great disparity that must have existed between the age of this man Edwards and the said John Bryant and the unknown origin of said John Bryant as testified to by his grand son Jack Bryant renders it morally certain to this Commission that Edwards could not have known what he swore to in reference to John Bryant's Cherokee blood and that this presentation of said affidavit of said Edwards as a protest in behalf of Plaintiff in that he did not establish the defendant's right to citizenship before the said

~~as far as in the establishment of the defendant's right to Citizenship before the said~~
~~Commission" was an imposition and fraud practiced in obtaining the citizenship~~
~~in question in this case.~~ The statement of Sam Bell that he is the
defendant, besides virtually testifying in his own behalf to establish an heirship to
a large inheritance in the Cherokee Nation is only hearsay and subject to the
same objections when taken in connection with the statements made by Zack
testifies that the father and mother of his grandfather John Bryant was unknown
nor was it known even where he was born. The truth is, it appears to
this Commission from the testimony of Zack Bryant who certainly has the
best opportunity of knowing or at least as good as any one now living that the
claim set up by the defendants that John Bryant was a Cherokee by blood
rests upon as vague hint or casual remark it may have been uttered by
him (John Bryant) over fifty years ago. Certainly common sense and
justice would require something more definite and tangible to establish a
right to citizenship in this Nation. The corrupt methods resorted to by
John Filippin a son of Hannah Joe Bowens and Sam Skinner both in law
of said Hannah et al and preceding the decree of Spears Commission so over-
whelmingly established by every witness for the Nation. This Commission
has no hesitancy in coming to the conclusion that the decree of the former
Commission in favor of Hannah Filippin et al was obtained in the midst
of debauchery, bribery and corruption in which one member of the Commission
was criminally implicated and the Clerk of the said Commission was perj-
-eys Commission.
Therefore the Commission agree and declare
the decree of the former Commission admitting Hannah Filippin et al to

The above two cases, that of Martha W. Brown, et al., and Lafayette Tiel, et al., applicants for Cherokee citizenship in the Cherokee Nation, were filed in this Office on the 30th day of May 1887. Both claiming descent from one Hosie Morgan, who they allege was of Cherokee Indian blood.

Martha W. Brown, nee Fleetwood, is the grand-daughter of Hosie Morgan, and Lafayette Tiel is the son of Martha W. Brown's sister - name unknown - consequently her nephew and the great-grandchild of Hosie Morgan. They both claim rights in the Cherokee Nation through the same source, that of being descendants from Hosie Morgan. The attorney, Messrs. Inley & Kitchcock, for Plaintiff, agreed with the Nation's Atty. Nowick, that these two cases should be tried and determined upon the same evidence, as they are identically the same in respect to Cherokee citizenship - i.e. if one is a Cherokee the other must be.

These cases were submitted to the Commission on Citizenship on the 2^d day of August 1888. All the evidence being upon which to base our decision.

— Summary —

The evidence of Charles Nickliff on part of the plaintiffs in this cause, goes to show that he is 68 years old and that he has known Lucy Fleetwood for about 58 years, and that he knew her back in the Old Nation and that she went to school at that time at Valley Town Mission, in the state of North Carolina and that this school was established for Cherokee and that he never knew any other than Cherokee children to attend this school, and that Lucy Fleetwood had two brothers that went to this Mission with her and that their names were Sam and Jerry and that he knew Rosie Morgan, who was the father of Lucy, Sam & Jerry and that he, Rosie Morgan, looked like a Indian but that he did not speak the Cherokee language, but understood it and that he was considered a Mexican or Spaniard.

Mr. Nickliff further says, that when a part of the Old Nation left Calhoun in the Old Nation in the year 1834, that he understood Rosie Morgan family came to this County with them, and that he came to this Nation in the year 1834, but did not know if Rosie Morgan family ever ever recognized him as Cherokee - He further says that he was 10 or 11 years old when he went to this Mission school, before mentioned, in North Carolina, and that it was during this time that Rosie Morgan family came into that section of County from the state of Georgia, and that he remained there about two years, but did not know if Rosie Morgan family had anykins-folks among the Cherokee, a not, but did know that the wife of Rosie Morgan had curly, kinky or nego hair.

J. L. Ward, District Judge of Delaware District Cherokee Nation, on the 20th day of June 1887, is wholly denied by said Nancy Starr on her cross examination made by the Nations Attorney, Leon, R. T. Wyly, on the 11th day of May 1887 - A letter of Judge J. L. Ward on his official signature, on file in this Office, goes to show that Nancy Starr cannot speak or understand the English language, and that he had an Interpreter - Lafayette Peel, on file applicant in this cause to interpret the statement that she very well knew made by said Nancy Starr, and that he Ward - does not understand the Cherokee language himself, and only recorded that which Lafayette Peel gave him to understand Nancy Starr should have said.

The testimony of Sam Johnson, taken before a former Commissioner on Citizenship, on the date of 19th Sept. 1883, in the Lucy Fleetwood case. (this before a former Commissioner and decision adverse to her on the 29th day of Sept. 1883) and that the claimants in the cause were recognized as Cherokees - that the boys had served as guards etc - but upon the cross examination he said that they never participated in the per capita payment of that year, of Cherokees.

William Wilson states in the matter of the claim of Lucy Fleetwood, the mother of Martha W. Brown, and grand mother of Lafayette Peel, before a Commissioner on Citizenship, under date of Oct. 1st 1883, that he knew Lucy Fleetwood, but did not know of what blood she was, that she looked like a half negro, and that he had her sons hired under a permit to do work for him in Delaware District, and that at one time they tried to prevent by him before the United States Court, that they were Cherokees.

a former Commission in the Glutwood case for citizenship,
says, that he is 52 years old and a Cherokee by birth
and that he was acquainted with the Glutwood family in
1852, and that they removed into the section of country
from Kansas, and that he knew them up to the year 1861,
and that he had three of Lucy Glutwood's boys employed
under permit to work for him, and that they were ac-
corded such names as Catales, and that he had them
employed the same as if they had been white men, and
that he knew them during the "Old Settler" payment in this
country, and that they never applied for money, claiming
they had no right to participate in the distribution of the fund.

The statement of John G. Horridge in the Lucy
Glutwood case, taken Sept. 29th 1884, shows that he
took the census of the "Old Settler" Cherokee, preparing
to making the payment to them, in the year 1851, and that
while doing so, he met Lucy Glutwood in Delaware District,
and she claimed to be one "Old Settler" Cherokee, and failed
to be enrolled as such. Mr. Horridge says, that she failed
to satisfy me, the census taker, that she was ever a Cherokee,
and that her name was not taken. She brought an Atty,
and witness to Tahlequah, the Capitol of the Cherokee Nation,
when the census rolls of "Old Settlers" were being completed,
to have her claim adjusted. The evidence was taken
before a Commissioner, says Mr. Horridge, composed of
Judge Drew, Cherokee Agent Brown; Lewis Rogers and myself,
in which it was shown that Lucy Glutwood came to this
Nation with a statement of Cherokee in the year 1852—but
failed to prove that she was of Cherokee Indian descent, this
was about the year 1850.

The testimony of Miss Ward, taken before this Commission on the 17th day of May 1888, shows that he is 72 years old and that he was acquainted with our Minnie Fleetwood who afterwards married a man by the name of Steven and lived at Benton Prairie in Cherokee District, Cherokee Nation, and that she is the daughter of Lucy Fleetwood and that he was also acquainted with her and was some-what with Fleetwood, a white man, her husband. The names of Lucy Fleetwood's children are, says Mr. Ward, Edward, Miles, Aquilla, Jerry, Anna, Sarah and Minnie, and of my other, the mother of Steve Edwards and Lafayette Tal - After the war he says, at an election in Okmulgee District, in which he was judge there Indians presented themselves to vote, but were not allowed to do so, as they were not recognized as citizens of the Cherokee Nation. That he was once speaking of their folks to Mr. Bill Ingalls, now dead, when Ingalls remarked that it was either his father or his grand-father that once owned Lucy Fleetwood's mother as a slave, and that Bill Ingalls was once a Deputy Marshal and stood as high for truth and honor among all men in Benton County, Arkansas.

The evidence of James Wofford in this case is both conclusive and satisfactory, as it not only shows that he was acquainted with the Fleetwood family in this Nation, but that he knew them in the old Nation, prior to the treaty of 1835. Mr. Wofford is a man of fair education and great integrity. He is now 82 years old and was a member of the Senate of the Cherokee Council in the old Nation, which position he held for several years until he removed to this country - and that he was

Mr. Hafford says that he knew Herin Morgan in the old Nation, and that he lived in the North Eastern District of the Nation, next to the North Carolina line, and that he then had a family some of whom were grown and that Herin Morgan claimed to be a Catawba Indian, and that his wife was a colored woman and had formerly been a slave, and that Herin Morgan left the country before the treaty of 1835. Mr. Hafford further states that Herin Morgan made application to the council in the old Nation for citizenship among the Cherokee, but that his request or petition was not granted, upon the ground that he was not a Cherokee, but was also born on account of him living as Catawba Indian, to open up a field in the (then) Cherokee Nation, upon which to make a living - that he knew Herin Morgan well, and that he, Herin Morgan, told him that he was a Catawba Indian, and was so regarded - and that Mr. Morgan, who used to own Herin Morgan's wife, the mother of Lucy Hafford, now grand-mother of Martha W. Brown, and great-grand-mother of Lafayette Tiel, as a slave, lived near the line of North Carolina, in one of the old Counties, and that this man Morgan just up to him, was the father of William Morgan, who is now dead, that used to live in Arkansas near the Cherokee line, who was once a Deputy Marshal, and earned well thought of by all who knew him.

The commission on Citizenship after taking into consideration the evidence in this case, and of the opinion that the applicants, Martha W. Brown, et al., and Lafayette Tiel, et al. are not Cherokee by blood, as the testimony is conclusive in its proof that they are of no admixture of Catawba and negro blood, with no evidence

whatever other than the allegations contained in the application for citizenship, that they are Cherokee which they have signing failed to establish.

The fact of Horis Morgan's children going to a Mission School established for Cherokee children, is a proof that they were Cherokee, only the supposition, which in the face of contradictory testimony sets this idea aside as being unworthy of belief. For the Missionary Schools of this day and time, and down to the present, are governed and controlled by the Missionary Councils of the various Churches, and Indians have nothing to do with this maintenance and support - They being wholly under the supervision of the Missionaries, and while their object was, and is, ostensibly to bring the Indians, it is a well known fact that children of any race, - white negroes & Cherokee attended these schools.

The Fleetwood family has not continuously resided in the Cherokee Nation, going out into the States and returning at intervals.

As to who Horis Morgan was, the ancestor alleged in their case, previous to his coming into the Cherokee Nation, is wholly unknown to this Committee, or even of other race of people he might have been, other than what he said himself - that he was a Calabash Indian - The evidence of Charles Wisthoff and James Whifford would seem to indicate that he might have been of Mexican extraction. On this point there is nothing definite.

We fail to find the name of Horis Morgan upon any of the Rolls of Cherokee mentioned in the 7th section of the Act approved Dec. 1st 1886, in relation to citizenship.

The application of Alfred Pool for citizenship in the Cherokee Nation was filed June 3rd 1887 and is based upon the ground that he is the son of one Aaron Pool who was enrolled upon the census rolls of Cherokee by blood Citizens of the Cherokee Nation taken and made in the year 1835 and who died at Bolivar Hardman County, Tennessee as appears from the Explor affidavit of one John Vantrease taken July 10-1885 before Ex. Clerk Clark County Clerk who states that Aaron Pool had a Cross with the Cherokee Indian in blood being about one fourth Indian on his Father side. Besides the insufficiency of such statement to establish the fact alleged the name of Aaron Pool is not found on the census rolls of 1835 separate. The Commission therefore decree that Alfred Pool is not of Cherokee blood and is not entitled to citizenship in the Cherokee Nation.
