

Halloing King of the Cowetas

Opoy Mico of my Town whom I had sent with a Talk to you, on his return he told me Your Talk, Since which the Second man of the Ousitches has been with me & to whom I Spoke a great deal & gave him my full Instructions respecting the affairs on hand & I expect he has conferred with you upon the Same.

Having considered that it is full time to execute the intended business, I have this day made the broken days to set out in, the same is sent all over this country, & the bearer will deliver them to you, & the last of the broken days is to set out upon & it is the Mad Dogs desire, that you & people &c. meet him at Tawa Lygee in the upper trading road.- You will meet him there that the matter may be properly conducted. --

If I can find a proper white man I shall send one with the Mad Dogs party, Hillebee &c. & full written instructions, all which I concert with the Mad Dog. Now before I return home. --

I have but one Talk more that is I hope our old Interpreter Dourouzeaux has not behaved Improperly, I regard him, & nothing will induce me to hurt him, provided he does not side with the enemies of our land. He has grown old in our land, he ought to regard himself a Creek redman & support the Country in which he has spent the most of his days ----

Gentlemen

Your Letter to me was immediately laid before the Council & a supply of Powder & Ball ordered to be deposited in the hands of the Commanding officer in your County for defence

I am hopeful the Gentlemen required by the orders of the Executive of the 24th. Ult. will immediately proceed to arrange the Militia agreeably thereto and when the proper officers are appointed and commissioned it will contribute much to system and good order.

I have accounts from different quarters all of which lead me to believe that some part of the Creek Nation are influenced by McGillevary to be unfriendly and that the Indians residing near him had Flour made were ready to go out to War.

I have now to require Gentlemen that every provident measure be taken for the security of your frontier and that the commanding officer cause the necessary observation to be continued for some time and in case of any approaching hostilities that he without delay make communication to me.
