At my arivel hear I found the Indians had got Mr Barnard to Write there answer to yours by Exprefs, I shall Demand satisfaction for the men Killed, and Doubt not but it will be Given although it is bad that the white people has Killed two Indians at the store but I hope you will have the person or persons apprehended, as I will promise to have them Delivered up as sone as taken, there is thre white Women in the upper-towns taken in the warre and one man kept as Slaves I will get them and the horses Stolen from Co^l Clark but I am in a fine Situation having no goods to pay Exprefses or any thing Else and I think, the State ought to send up at least one or two hundred pound in Dry goods - I had the bad chance that in the oconey River my horse fell Down and my pocket book Dropt out, I have lost my Instructions and your talk With a number of other peapers, you will please order Copys to be made out and send up and if you would pleas send up Sum Instructions Concerning trend, as I will Call the Indians and white people together what Ever is worth transmitting, you shall have sent down, I should have ben up sum time but I Could not Get any person to come with me for fear and the Rivers was high, and at Last I was obliged to come by my Self, I asure you the Indians is as much afraid of us as we Could be of them for all there out towns was Redey to move if I had Not come up I have the Honor to be

 Respect of Coll^o M^cMurphy Agent I Receved His Letter the furft of this
 and has been with him interpetten and shall be oblege to go with him to
 the Tuckabatches whaer Shall have a genorell meeting of the whole Nation and
 fienall anfwer will then be given in Rispect of the Grants of Land^t that
 has been given as the uper Towns haed men it apears has and is againft all
 the grants by the advife of M^r Alle^x M^cGillverey who is so much attached to
 Spanish Government that I Expect Matters Not be Moderaetted in the uper Towns
 so well as they have been in the Lower Towns but I have graet hoepes that we
 shall settle matters to beft, you may Rely that Nothing in my obelitey Shall
 be wonted you may by the Talks from thefe parts are, and be a Juge how vell
 they are Satisfied at prefent

I muft beg to be Excufed to Trouble
 your Honor in Rispect of my Sollerey, as I have been Now a Long time in
 Sarvis of the State, and not yett Receved any thing Even to by my provition
 I am under a Necefistey forft to apply to you, if you will plese to send me
 to the of fifteen or Twentey pound Worth of goods Sutch as M^r Timothy Barnard
 will plese to Chufe it whill be moft Kindly Excepted and Redockt it out of
 my Sollerey untel the Gentlemen Legueflaetur is plesed to provid and Setts
 a Sollerey for the Department of the Nation - as I am a poor man and Not
 Able in bying Every Neseferery to Live I am oblege to aply to your Selfe

hoeping you will plefe to afsift me Now at this prefent - you will
 be fulley acquainted of Everey perticular by Coll.^O M^CMurphey untell we
 have haed the Meetting Over at the Tuckeybatches when I hoep we Shall
 be able to give a full account of the Situation of the whole Nation I am

Dr Sir /

I received your favor with the Talks from the Governor & the Comifsoners, and told the Indians if they would call a Meeting I would tell them the Contentes of them, But they Seemed to be Willing to wait untel the people waer returned from St: Augurteen as it was no Matter of a Speedey consequence Every thing Quiet all Waiting for an answer from M^r White as M^r M^cGilverey haed told them to be Still & mind Nothing out thaer planting & hunting when whaer informed of a a going of Oejoyes going Doune on the frontaers to Comitt Murder, it put the whole of the Lower in fright and they Said what has proved sence tow true that they who waer inofrentley Hunting would sufer which has been the case and has tell on our most sencear and bert friends, Mine is found out they are afraid that is Not all thaer Lo's as thaer is savorall hunting still Not found nor haera off- They Apaer to me as if that they haed Some incoregement that they be Glad to taek Some revenge on the Dam'nd Wellins that has been the Cause of thaer losing so meney inofrent men Your prence haer would be of Graet Sarvis to parrayry the Indians at this juncter, as I beleve Naver Did any Indion Moderatte things in so mild a manner as there have Done Now at this time as you may se by the talk that they send Doune, but I am afraid thing^s are gone rather too far for them to be maed up again - I shall wait to inter- prett and answer to this talk that is sent now, and if no other aiference is sent me from the State of Georgia then what has been I shall be oblege to seek some Other way to maintain my selfe, then being an interpreitter, and receive Nothing I have seen two yae the 18th Last may and attended two

Traettey' and has Never received any things Last Fall at the
 Occenys, if you will take upon your Selfs to Engage me my
 solierey I shall Act for George and endeavor to keep as money
 as I find as porable, But if the Dont Fall of employing me,
 and Give me Some Enfhorence of my Getting my pay, better
 then I have for the time part, I might sett my Leving Ouer
 way as I Cant Live on the Are - Hoever if I am Not wormey
 thaer employe I Shall be thaer well winner, I shall be glad
 to hear from you and your Opinion on affaires at this Cretliche
 time and I Do Sir Your
