Sir after a Very fatigueng journey we have had the honour of Delivering your Dispatches to Governor Sevier which had a favourable Reception, he Intends as soon as pofsible to call his Afsembly and Expects to have it in his Power to raise one thousand or fifteen hundred men in case matters could be Reduced to a Certainty and they should be wanting, the People we have had the Honour to see in this Country are all mutch Inclined to favour the Georgians by Afsisting them against the Creek Indians and will Certainly be of Infinite service In case there can be such a Communication had, as will put it in your Power to have them when most wanting, we Intend this day to set out in order to pursue our journey and are under the Disagreeable Nefsesity of going by Kentucky and Cumberland as every one says the other way would be very Dangerous, we shall do Every thing in our power to Cultivate the Friendship of the Good People of this State as we pafs through, We have every Reason to believe they are sincerely Inclined to Afsist Georgia all they can.
