William F. Carter being first duly sworn, deposes and says:

That I am 30 years of age and live in Polk Co., Ga. I claim through my father, Byrd Carter, and my grandfather, Thomas Carter. All of my other grandparents were white. My father was born in Thomas Co., N.C. He was a year old when he left there. He is something over fifty years of age. Don't know where my grandfather Thompson Carter was born. My father claimed 1/4 Cherokee. My grandfather lived among the Indians in N. C. but I don't know whether he ever lived with them as a member of ~~that~~ tribe. Don't know whether my father or grandfather were ever on any rolls. I am recognized as a white man with some Indian blood. My father now lives at Childersburg, Ala. (Talladega Co.)

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
Thomas R. Trammell, witness for Jane Carter, after being first duly sworn, deposes and says:

I know Jane Carter and have known her ever since she has been in Georgia. I knew her father. He claimed to be a Cherokee Indian. I do not know if he claimed to be a full blood or not. He was tall with straight black hair and black beard. He spoke the Indian language. I do not know if he ever received any Indian money except that he said he never did. He said he never tried to get any. He was fixing to try when he died. He was a farmer. He and I went to the Cherokee Nation among the Indians in N.C. and they recognized him as a Cherokee Indian. An Indian by the name of Sanders recognized him as an Indian. Sanders was probably a half breed. He was an interpreter for the preachers. A man would preach and he would tell it to the Indians in Indian language. I do not remember if he ever said anything about why he was not paid in 1852. I am 78 years of age. R. Carter was a voter. I know him from the time he came here about 1853 until he died. I know he was a voter because we were friends and always voted together. Her brothers and cousin were with me in the Civil War.
